Sandy Pupils Back to School September 2

Early Registration At High School Listed Friday, August 30

School bells will ring in Sandy Tuesday, September 2 and hundreds of pupils will be called back to freshly varnished desks and floors.

Sandy grade schools will start September 2 at 8:45 a.m. Pupils are to come prepared to spend a full day at school. The cafeteria will be in operation. Busses will run the same as last year.

All first grade beginning pupils who have not already registered should register at the Sandy grade school Saturday afternoon August 30 at 2 p.m. Beginning pupils first grade must have birth certificate and evidence of recent physical examination.

New Teachers

Six new teachers have been assigned to positions at Sandy grade school for the oncoming school year, says Harry Harvie, superintendent. No replacement has been announced for Clark Lund, PE teacher who was killed early this week.

Mrs. Margaret Yearout, Portland, will teach fourth grade; Miss Goldie Carroll, Springfield, will have a seventh grade class; Mrs. Eva Marie Cockell, Portland, is assigned to fifth grade; George M. Sponsler, Portland, will teach a seventh grade; Miss Barbara Walters, Gresham, who has been teaching near Grants Pass, will teach second grade; and Mrs. Ben Spahr, Sandy, has a third grade at Sandy Ridge. All are very well qualified for the positions they are assigned to, says Harvie.

A teachers meeting will be held Saturday, August 30 starting at 10 a.m.

High School

Registration at Sandy Union high school is scheduled Friday, August 29, at 8:45 a.m. with classes held afterwards, says Croston, principal. Regular classes will start Tuesday, Sept. 2.

Three new teachers have been awarded contracts at the high school. Robert Taylor, Vancouver, Washington, will teach public speaking, journalism 1 and 2, English 3, and direct one class play. Biology and English will be taught by Raymond Befus, Corvallis, Oregon. Miss Naida Fuqua, who taught last year at Franklin high school in Portland, will teach math and algebra.

A teachers' workshop is to be set up Wednesday and Thursday, August 27 and 28. Joseph Hall, state department of education at Salem, will be there to help.

August 25 to 29 inclusive, has been set as enrollment week by the Immanuel Lutheran school for those who have not already made application. A worship service will mark the opening of the school on September 2, at 8:45 a.m.

Huckleberries Are Few In Mount Hood Area

Seekers of the elusive huckleberry will find few in the Mt. Hood national forest this year, forest ranger Jim Langdon reported.

In the high rock locale above Estacada, rangers reported huckleberries in open areas were almost entirely frost killed. However, fair to good scattered patches of huckleberries are to be found in protected spots and on sheltered slopes in that vicinity and are ready to be picked.

The berries growing on sheltered slopes in the Squaw lake Lookout spring, Squaw mountain area are more plentiful.

Reports from Mirror lake are that no berries survived frosts. Similar reports came from Wolf butte lookout.

In the Kinzel lake area, foresters said "a lot of berries would be ready for picking in a week or two."

Larch mountain has an average crop of huckleberries but pickers who are rushing the season are not giving them a chance to get ripe, a forest ranger said. Berries in that area will be ready in about a week.

Still Looking For Dump Site In Hood Area

Sweeten Site In Dover District Proposed By Investigating Group

Tuesday night's meeting at the city hall produced one more lead in the search for a dump in the Mt. Hood area which will meet the necessary requirements. After the county court hearing on the matter of last week, a committee of three was appointed among the people opposing the proposed site off the Loop highway to investigate other possible sites. These three, Steve Mollner, D. V. Lauzon, and Otto Motejl met with the Sandy City Council Tuesday night of this week to report their findings.

The site they proposed is owned by J. J. Sweeten and located about four miles from Shorty's Corner, about seven miles from Sandy, in the Dover district. Mollner said he felt that it met all the specifications for a dump.

Neither the Sandy City Council nor the 3-man committee have any authority to locate a dump. The result of the meeting was a decision to notify the county health officer and county court of the location of the Sweeten site, and have them investigate its suitability. The men attending the meeting also agreed to look further in their search for a site, not ignoring the possibility of a location in the Kelso-Boring or Eagle Creek area.

September 6 is the date set by the county commissioners to hear the final outcome of the agreement worked out by the groups concerned.

County Fair Dates Set For August 26-29

Fire Strikes Bittner And Motejl Mills

A donkey engine near where Motejl's mill used to be, caught on fire Wednesday morning and caused about \$1000 damage. Trash was being burned, and got out of control.

A fire in the office of Bittner Plug Co. mill caused extensive damage Wednesday noon. The dwelling will need a new roof, and the interior needs mending and repainting. Water damage was extensive. It was thought the fire started in the attic.

Mystery Surrounds Death of Woman

The body of Mrs. Catherine Boyd, 49-year-old Eagle Creek mother, was found lying face down in a six-inch pool of water at the base of a Clackamas river cliff by a posse early Sunday morning.

The official autopsy report signed by county coroner Ray Rilance, listed drowning as the cause of death, but cause of the drowning was listed as "undetermined." No coroner's inquest will be held.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 1 p.m. at the Riverside cemetery chapel.

Survivors include her husband, 15-year-old daughter and other relatives.

The daughter, Mary Lou, told officers that Mrs. Boyd left for Sandy Saturday noon to shop and pick up laundry, returning home at 1:30 p.m. Later she apparently wrote a note to her husband saying she was going for a walk. As far as investigators can determine she was not seen alive again.

Mr. Boyd told authorities he refused to believe his wife committed suicide and said \$900 was missing from his logging business.

Sandy Youth Injured When Car Hits Span

Teddy Richard Byers, a 20-year-old Sandy youth, was taken to Good Samaritan hospital early Tuesday, August 12 suffering a spine injury after his car struck an abutment of the Wildcat creek bridge east of Sandy.

State police said that after the car struck the abutment it flew through the air and landed on the opposite side of the creek. The car was completely demolished.

Ted said he had fallen asleep at the wheel.

Clark Lund Funeral Rites Saturday, 2 pm

Sandy Grade School Teacher Killed Monday Unloading Truck

Funeral services for Clark Lund, Sandy grade school teacher killed Monday evening while unloading a log truck, will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the chapel of Carroll's Funeral Home in Gresham.

The accident which snuffed out the life of one of the most loved teachers in the Sandy school system took place about 5:30 on Monday evening of this week. Lund, who taught in the Sandy grade school since 1946, was driving a logging truck for Gundersen Bros. during the summer vacation months.

Not having come in with the truck at the accustomed time Monday evening, Mrs. Harold Gunderson went down to Tupper Lumber Company to check there, while her husband was calling other possible places. She discovered the truck near the Tupper mill pond, and the body of Lund under three logs about 6:45.

She ran back to the office to get several Tupper employees who came back and removed the logs. One log had struck Lund on the side of the head and the other two were resting on his legs. This would have been his last week of work driving the logging truck.

There were no witnesses to the accident, but evidence at the scene indicated Lund had removed the three binder chains from the load and was clipping the hooks to release the blocks when the logs crashed down on him. Apparently, he was killed instantly.

Lund was born May 1, 1909 at Astoria, Oregon. He attended school at Boring and was a graduate of Sandy high school and Monmouth State Teachers College. In 1930 he was married to Jay Dean Nelson at Salem, Oregon.

A resident of the Boring area for 15 years, Clark's present address was route 1 box 92, Boring. He was a member of the Trinity Lutheran church of Gresham.

Lund is survived by his wife, Jay Dean; three children: Clark Leroy Lund of Boring, Mrs. J. E. (Dorothy) Gaultney of Albany, Oregon, and Mrs. Donald (Lenore) Kipp of Boring; one grandchild, seven brothers, and five sisters: Lewis (a twin brother) of Astoria; Edwin of Astoria, Mrs. Florence Kaufman of Culver City, Calif., Raymond Lund of Astoria, W. B. Lund of Charleston, Oregon, Mrs. Alice Hite of Anchorage, Alaska, Mrs. Gladys Olson of Culver City, California, Mrs. Blanche Morgan of Klamath Falls, Clifford Lund of Oakland, California, Marvin (Continued on Page 8)
