Henry O. Eri Dies; Services Held Saturday

Funeral services for Henry Oswald Eri were held at the chapel of the Carroll Funeral home at 2 p.m. Saturday, August 16. Rev. Mark A. Tolney of Central Presbyterian church, Portland, conducted the services and William Elliott was the soloist. Interment was in Forest Lawn cemetery.

Mr. Eri, a resident of the Gresham area for 61 years, suffered a heart attack while driving home on Stark street Tuesday morning.

He was born in Corvallis on August 14, 1887, and had lived in this area from the age of three until he moved to Medford for two years in 1934.

He owned and operated a store at Kelso for several years, then retired in 1941. Active in local and community affairs, he was also a member of the Sandy Masonic lodge, the Al Kader Shrine in Portland, and the Sandy Pioneer society. He was a member

of the Norwegian Lutheran church. An outdoorsman, he was an avid fisherman and hunter. He married Miss Dora Kline on October 31, 1908, in Portland.

He is survived by his wife, Dora; three sons, Alvin of Sandy, Clarence of Corbett, and Wallace of Medford; a brother, Gilbert Eri of Boring, and four grand-
