Eisenhower's Talk Sparks Sandy Effort

Sandy Hospital Board Encouraged by Ike's Stand on Hill Burton
News of President Eisenhower's request to congress to continue support of the Hill-Burton hospital construction program renewed hope and vigor to Sandy's Memorial Hospital board this week.

Meet Tomorrow
The hospital's board of directors is scheduled to meet with George Shiffer, director of the Oregon State Hospital Facilities and Planning Division of the Board of Health at the State Office Building in Portland tomorrow, Fri., Jan. 22.

This meeting will be the initial step in the negotiations to obtain approval and financial assistance from the federal government in completing Sandy's partially built hospital.

Present Structure OK'd
Recently the incompleting hospital building was inspected by a team composed of a state department engineer, a U. S. Public Health Service architect, and two architects from the original architectural firm of Roel, Schmeer and Harrington.

The team's report was that the building, and location, is fully acceptable as a "pick up project" to the Public Health Service.

Sandy Matmen Lose to Canby; To Meet Molalla

Sandy's matmen were crushed by Canby's Cougars 40-25 Tues., Jan. 12 at Canby.

Documentary Sea Film This Week at Sandy

Heralded as one of the screen's most unusual pictures, and winner of the Academy Award as best documentary feature of the year, "The Sea Around Us" comes to the Sandy Theater this weekend, Jan. 22, 23, 24.

In Technicolor
The technicolor picture is an adaptation of Rachel L. Carson's unique best-seller of the same name.

The picture reveals to the public scenes which have never before been seen except by scientists and oceanographers. Companion feature is "Devil's Canyon" with Virginia Mayo, a fictional story based on a historical incident, also in technicolor.

Metsger Gets Sandy PM OK Of Committee

Veteran Recommended To County Executive Comm. by Local Comm.

At a meeting held Wednesday night of last week at Oregon City, the local Republican committee recommended John Metsger to the county executive committee as Sandy's next postmaster.

Metsger placed highest on the Civil Service examinations. No approximate date could be ascertained as to when an appointment would be made. The county executive committee makes its recommendation to Rep. Walter Norblad at Wash., D. C.

In South Pacific
A native of New York state, Metsger finished high school at Schroon Lake, N. Y. He served in the U. S. Marine Corps from 1942 to 1945, attached to Office Naval Intelligence, with 18 months service in the South Pacific.

After the World War II he attended Woodbury college at Woodbury, Calif., majoring in business administration and higher education. In 1946 he married Velma Anderson of Ventura, Calif., and moved to Sandy the following year.

The Metsgers have three children: Judy 3½, Ricky 2½, and Jeanette, 6 months. At present Metsger is an accountant in the office of Brenton Vedder.

Church Committee Formed to Sponsor Athletic Program

Inter-Church Athletic Committee Petitions Grade School Board for Use of Gymnasium in Supervised Community-Wide Athletic Program

The question of whether or not the Sandy area will have a real community athletic program will probably be definitely decided tomorrow night when the Sandy grade school board will hear a petition from the newly formed Inter-Church Athletic Committee for use of the school's gymnasium.

Signed by authorized representatives of the Assembly of God, Christian Science Society, Church of Christ, Community Presby- terian, Immanuel Lutheran, San-

day Baptist Chapel, and Seventh Day Adventists, the petition is addressed to the board of directors of Sandy grade school district No. 46 and reads as follows:

All Churches Asked
"We the undersigned have united to form the Inter Church Athletic Committee for a community-wide athletic program. We are petitioning you for the use of the grade school gymnasium by the various churches represented in our group. It is our desire to represent the whole community through the several churches of Sandy, and thus have the gymnasium made available for a supervised program of athletics by the young people of our community. We have attempted to secure representation from all of the churches of Sandy, and we take this opportunity to extend to any not now represented on this committee to send a representative to it.

Committee Responsible
"Our desire is to assign to each of the churches of Sandy a definite time for their group to use the gymnasium. Said group would then be responsible for the school building, and for the conduct of those using the gym on that night. Said group would then be responsible to this committee for any infraction of the rules that occurred during their period in the building; thus, the school board would not have to deal with any individual church group, but would deal directly with this committee.

Own Equipment
"Each of the church groups would be expected to have its own athletic equipment. All people allowed on the gym floor would be expected to wear approved gym shoes to keep from damaging the floor.

"It is the intention of this committee to schedule activities at such an hour that we would be out of the building before the night custodian had completed his normal work. It is also our intention to do as much of our own janitorial service as is possible and practical.

Represent Community
"It is our belief that all of the young people of the community will find an opportunity with some of our member groups to use the facilities, and we therefore believe that we are representing the whole community of Sandy."

Ken Flath was elected chairman of the committee, whose

next meeting will be this Sat., Jan. 23, 7 p.m., at the Community-Presbyterian church.

Blake Comments
Bill Blake, chairman of the grade school board, had this to say on the subject when interviewed by the Sandy Post.

"The leaders of the Sandy churches are to be commended for their efforts to establish a well supervised athletic program for all of this community who wish to enter.

Program Needed
"A program of this nature has long been the need and desire of the people of this area. Although athletics may not be prominent in the minds of many of us, the fellowship derived will no doubt be of value to all of us.

"The Sandy grade school board will meet Fri., Jan. 22," concluded Blake, "to consider permitting the use of the school gymnasium for this purpose."

Sandy Hi Youths Injured in Wreck

Mike Burns and Richard Cary, Sandy high school students, were injured Friday evening when the car they were riding in went out of control on the Mt. Hood Loop highway and plunged over a bank.

Mike, most seriously injured of the two, was taken to Emanuel hospital, Portland, for treatment of severe facial cuts. Richard was treated by Dr. Elton Leavitt and allowed to go home.

The accident occurred near the Hood chalet.
