get back home again—thanks to a trusting friend.

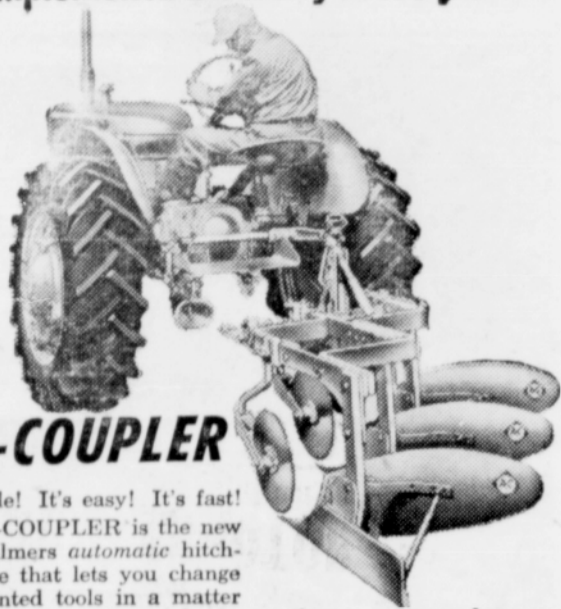

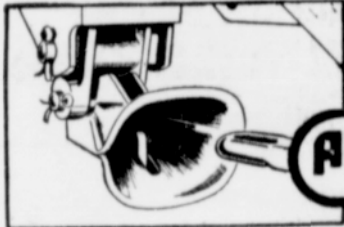

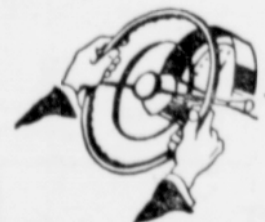
