The public is invited to attend a meeting at the Wemme clubhouse Thurs., Feb. 4 at 7:30 p.m. Kenneth Hill, Oregon State college senior who at present is doing practice teaching in the agriculture classes at Sandy H., will show colored slides and tell of his experiences in Norway. Mr. Hill, who was an International Farm Youth Exchange Delegate to Norway this last year, lived with four farm families in different sections of the country and at an agricultural school. He shared in the daily work and social life of the families which provided an opportunity for him and the families

to observe and discuss the customs, life and culture of their respective countries.

Two-Way Exchange

The International Farm Youth Exchange is a two-way exchange. Selected farm youths from the United States are sent to live and work with farm families in other countries for four to six months. Farm youths from co-operating countries are sent here to live and work with our farm families, thus promoting understanding between the two countries, the basis on which the International Farm Youth Exchange was founded.

Relate Experiences

When these delegates return home, they devote considerable time telling and showing others the benefits of their experiences.

This exchange program, begun in 1948, is now carried on with 40 countries in Latin America, the Near and Far East, South Pacific, Africa, and Europe. Through 1948 to 1953 there have been 346 foreign exchanges and 395 United States delegates who have participated in the program.

From Cove

Mr. Hill comes from Cove, Union county, Oregon. He is one of the nine young men and women from Oregon who have participated in this program. He has been an active member in 4-H, winning a trip to National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago in 1949, for being State Field Crop winner.
