Here's Info On Grade School Election Laws

Three vacancies on the Sandy grade school board of directors will be filled at the annual election held the third Monday in June.

Director's terms expiring are Maurice F. Seibert and E. M. Nelson. The vacancy left by the resignation of J. Miller, now being filled by Mrs. Hazel Murray by appointment, makes a total of three offices to fill.

Here are the laws regarding the election.

"111-905. Annual meeting: When held: Fiscal year. The annual school meeting in all organized districts shall be held on the third Monday in June, 1902, and every year thereafter, or, if it be a legal holiday, the next day thereafter, for the transaction of such business as shall properly come before it; and the fiscal school year shall begin on July 1 and end on June 30 of the year following."

"111-1216. Election: Method of nomination: Ballots: Blank spaces. The name of any qualified elector shall be placed on the ballot as a candidate for the office of school director upon filing with the clerk of the school district, at least seven days prior to the date of the election, of a certificate of nomination, signed by not less than 3 per cent of the number, and in no case by less than ten persons, of the qualified electors voting for the office of school director at the last annual school election; provided, however, that there shall be filed with the clerk an acceptance of nomination by the nominee at least five days prior to the date of such election, otherwise such nomination shall be void."
