Sandy Delegation Attends SDA 47th World General Conference

Pastor Clare Bishop and family, Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Meeker, Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Wertman, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Parker and Mrs. B. H. Herndon of Sandy are attending the Seventh-day Adventist's 47th General Conference being held at the Cow Palace in San Francisco, Calif., from May 29 to June 5.

Andrew C. Fearing, president of the Nevada-Utah Conference spoke to the 20,000 delegates and visitors on the subject, "Don't cheat you children of their birthright."

Speaking on the sound structure of the home, Elder Fearing said, "Your children have a right to your attention, and your understanding. The establishment of a Christian home and the raising of boys and girls is the greatest science in the world."

"The exercise of parental authority is sometimes necessary," the minister pointed out. "There is a weakness that can be absolutely evil. Proverbs 29:15 says: 'The rod and reproof give wisdom; but a child left to himself bringeth his mother to shame.'"

Emphasizing the importance of

the love of Christ in the home, Mr. Fearing said, "The heathen have no homes; they have only houses. 'Except the Lord build the house, they labour in vain that build it.'"

Youth Session

As part of the denomination's program for its youth, a special session for young people was held at the Civic Auditorium simultaneously with the adult meeting. High light of the youth's schedule for the day, attended by some 9,000 young people, was a missions pageant with delegates from 100 overseas countries participating. Natives and missionaries wore the colorful costumes of their countries, and the challenge of missions brought thousands of young people to their feet in consecration for the task.

Earlier in the week delegates heard their Home Missionary secretary, T. L. Oswald of Washington, D.C., report nearly \$33,000,000 worth of welfare work accomplished by Adventists during the past four years.

Medical Director

Dr. T. R. Flaiz, medical director from Washington, disclosed that the denomination is now operating 20 sanitariums and hospitals in North America besides 25 privately owned Adventist institutions.

Mass Communications

Mass communications came in for attention when the church's television program, "Faith for Today," seen on 115 stations each Sunday, was filmed on the stage of the Civic Auditorium before an audience of 8,000. Appearing before the TV cameras were Penny Edwards, recently converted Hollywood actress, and her husband, Ralph Winters. Both have accepted the Adventist faith. It was reported that the church's "Voice of Prophecy" radio program is now heard on some 800 stations throughout the world.

Business of the session say Reuben R. Figuhr of Washington D. C., elected world president of the denomination, replacing W. H. Branson, who announced his retirement. Figuhr has been a vice-president.
