Built Kelso Post Office
She first caught sight of him when he drove into Sandy with a hay rack loaded with 45 children and adults from Kelso headed for the festival. He was then operating the store and post office at Kelso that he had built two or three years earlier.

Mr. Jarl came to Oregon from northern Wisconsin in 1889 with his parents when he was 17, next to the oldest of eleven children. His father's plan for building a store was cut short by his sudden death soon after their arrival, and Joe carried on.

After making arrangements for setting up a post office his next problem was to find a name for it. The name "Kelso" was accepted in Washington, D.C., after several other had been turned down because of their length, he relates.

Had Lumber Business
The Jarls moved into living quarters back of the store immediately after their marriage and continued to live and run the business there for nine years. They sold it to a brother, R. E. Jarl, in 1905.

Later they moved to a farm a mile from Kelso and Mr. Jarl bought a sawmill, Sandy Ridge Lumber company, which he ran for ten years. In the meantime Mrs. Jarl ran the farm and "raised kids, calves and pigs," milked 12 registered Jersey cows as well as doing her husband's bookwork.

Mr. Jarl "did the figuring," though, and still takes pride in the fact that even though he has only a fifth grade education "when he figures anything it is figured right." Mrs. Jarl's specialty is spelling—spelling and history are her favorite subjects of study.

Life was a little easier after the sawmill was sold and they had acquired 680 acres of logged-off land on which they ran cattle.

Plan 'Easy Life'
After "46 years and one day" on the farm they sold their home and 114½ adjacent acres to R. L. Norman and moved into Gresham on 5th street. A year ago they moved to their present home on West 8th and like living there.

Mrs. Jarl decided that after so many years of hard work she "wasn't going to do a thing" when she came to town. Because she loves flowers and "they are easier to take care of than grass" she took out all the grass (except a narrow strip) in her front lawn and planted it with flowers.

Another of her "loves" is horses and she has shelves lined with small replicas of them collected from many countries. She recently started collecting hobbie glassware, too. Reading is one of her favorite pastimes but she considers fiction a waste of time and sticks to her favorite subject—history.

Among her most prized possessions are several well marked books on the early history of eastern Kentucky. Of the rugged
