Wy'east Garden Club Slates Flower Show; Entries Invited

The theme "Bowers of Flowers" has been chosen for the annual Wy'east Garden club's flower show to be held Tues., Aug. 17 at the Wemme Community hall.

Entries from the Sandy and Mountain area are especially invited.

Nell Howe and Lorraine Lyne, chairmen for the flower show, have announced the following schedule:

RULES

1. Entries must be received between 9:00 and 10:30 a.m. of Aug. 17 at the Wemme Community Hall. Entries may be removed at 4 p.m. Judging will be between 11 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Open to the public at 1:30.

2. Each exhibitor may make one exhibit in each class.

3. All materials for horticulture classes must be grown by the exhibitor. All horticultural specimens should be correctly and legibly labeled. Naming increases the value of each exhibit. Self foliage should be with each exhibit.

4. House plants must have been in your possession for at least three months.

5. The standard system of judging will be used: blue, red and white ribbons will be given to denote first, second and third places.

6. No one is permitted in room when judges are at work.

7. Read schedule carefully. Your exhibits must be properly classified.

8. Decisions of the judges will be final.

9. No glass vases may be used as containers except for table centerpieces.

BE A GOOD SPORT. SUGGESTIONS

In arrangements no leaves or debris floating in water. No part of the arrangement should be resting on edge of dish. Try not to overdo by putting too much in one arrangement. Keep them simple.

Colors and vase should go together.

Miniatures should be measured for width as well as height.

Disbud Dahlias. Glads should have continuous blooms 2/3 to 3/4 of the stem. Take out spurs.

Phlox should be even and dense blooms.

Section C Dahlias

Class 1 Pompon (2 inches or less in diameter) single bloom on a stem.

Class 3 Ball, One specimen any color. Single bloom on a stem.

Section D Phlox

Class 1 Perennial, 3 stalks one or more colors.

Section E Petunia

Class 1 Petunia singles best display in one container.

Class 2 Petunia double best display in one container.

Section F Roses

Class 1 Best specimen, one cluster or bloom any color according to variety.

Division 2 Corsages

Class 1 Dry

Class 2 Fresh

Division 3 Childrens Arrangements

Class 1 Miniatures not to exceed 3 inches.

Class 2 Arrangements in cup and saucer.

Division 4. Artistic arrangements

Section A

Class 1. Arrangements around the world. A composition using materials and figurines typical of a country.

1. Holland

2. Mexico

3. Japan

Section B

Arrangement in brass, copper or silver container

Section C

Monochromatic arrangement. One color with its tints and shades including container.

Dry arrangements. Made from dried materials.

Miniatures

Class 1 Miniatures not to exceed 3 inches including container.
