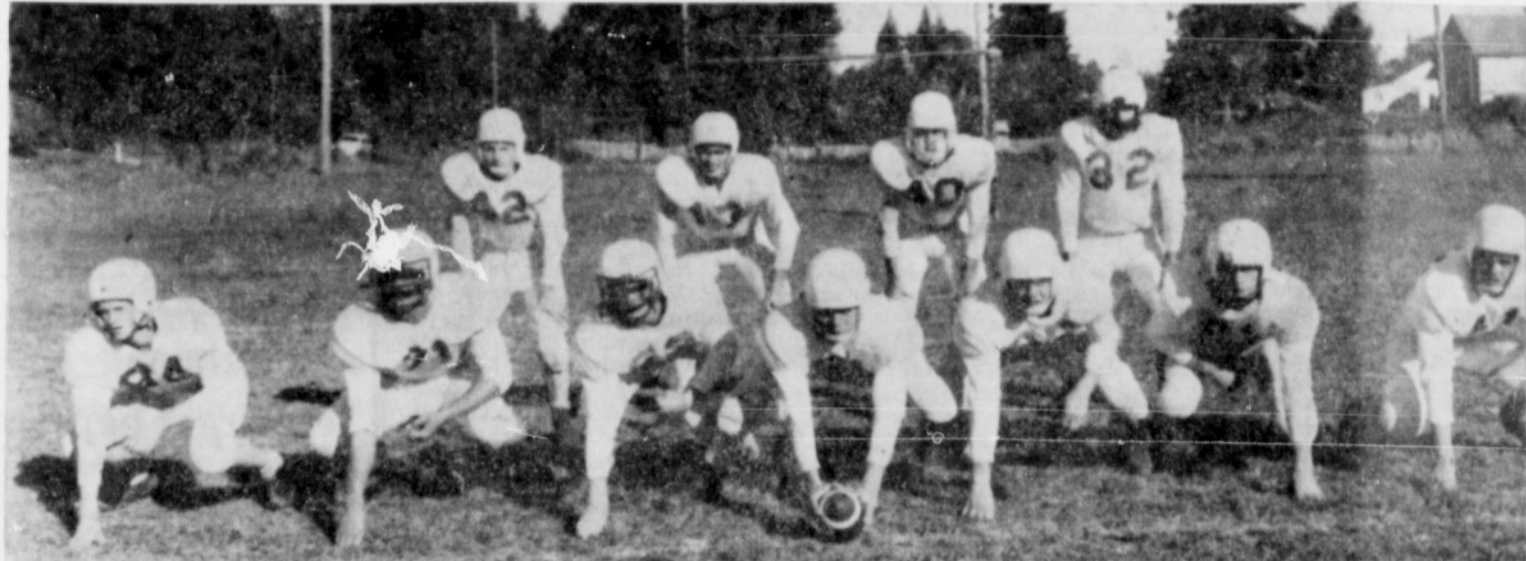

Sandy JV's Score Over Canby 15-9

Sandy JV's home Tuesday, Oct. 13, to over run Canby little more 15-9.

A 15 yard pass from Dallas Aschoff to Carroll Baylink brought the Pioneers 6 counters in first stanza play. Gene Garrett added to this by a conversion on a quick opener. The little Cougars scored soon after when a blocked punt, kicked by Aschoff, totaled 2 points for a safety.

A 25 yard pass and a 15 yard run to hit pay-dirt in second stanza play, followed by a completed conversion brought in Canby's final score. Passes seemed in order when again Aschoff tossed the pigskin 15 yards to Baylink who ran 30 yards to cross the stripes, making a half timescore of 13-9.

The only score in the last half was made for Sandy by Arch Woodard as he recovered a fumble for 2 points on a safety. Canby came close during the last 3 minutes of play, but were held on the 2 yard line by the strong Sandy defense.

Pioneer defense looked exceptionally good boasting such men as Bob Rohde, John West, Darrell Gillum, Jack Fitzgerald and Woodard.

Pioneers Defeat Mt. Angel in One Sided Score 27-0

Jerry Young rolled again for Sandy during their tussle with Mt. Angel to bring in a total of 21 points on 3 touchdowns and 3 conversions, boosting his seasons total to first place in Clackamas county.

Young rambled for 245 yards, rushing, for an average of slightly over 10 yards per carry as the Pioneers went on to defeat the Angels 27-0 on the foreign field Friday, Oct. 15.

Sandy's other half-back, Garry Skala, was not to be forgotten as he carried the pigskin for 100 yards which averaged 6.25 yards per carry.

Big line anchors, Floyd Rohde and co-captain Guy Buswell, opened the way for Young, proving to be the main reason for his big night. This was brought out by Young after the game when he stated, "it's pretty easy to make yardage when you have blockers in front of you like I did tonight."

Team statistics show a total of 377 yards for the Pioneers against 149 for Mt. Angel. Complete domination of the game was taken by the victors, letting the Angels get past their 40 yard line only once.

Jim Grojacques and Dick Susee lead the Angels, showing outstanding skill throughout the tussle.

New Jail for County Urged By Inspector

Added incentive toward the building of new Clackamas County jail facilities was provided this week with the visit of George O. Parker, federal prison inspector, to the present quarters on the third floor of the county court house in Oregon City. Parker deplored the present jail as outdated and crowded.

After touring the 80-acre site of the present county experimental station, Parker recommended building a new county jail farm at that location, to house 50 prisoners, with room for expansion at a future date. He estimated such construction would cost about \$100,000.

According to Parker, present facilities can house about 15 prisoners, while the average number of prisoners is 40. He remarked that the jail is not adequate for temporary housing of federal prisoners. Juvenile facilities are outdated, and should be removed from adult quarters, he said, and no rehabilitation is provided for prisoners.

Suggestions to remodel the present jail, or construct a new fourth floor jail were vetoed by Parker, on the grounds that it would still not be adequate and would cost more than to build an entirely new jail.

The removal of the present jail to other quarters would provide more space for county offices, Parker added.

Mrs. Bertha Ault, clerk of the Cottrell school district, came up with an idea which school officials believe may solve a dangerous safety problem that forces youngsters to cross a street before entering the school playground.

Mrs. Ault suggested trading land with the county in order to eliminate the road and provide a playground adjacent to the school grounds.

She said school property some 150 feet south of the present street would make an ideal site for a new road.

Members of the county court promised to investigate and asked Vern Moehne, road superintendent, to prepare a cost survey of the proposed project.

Man Found Ill, Dies Enroute to Hospital

Efforts to save the life of Louis E. Holden, route 1, box 203-A, Sandy, failed last Thursday when the man died while being taken to Oregon City hospital.

Holden, 65, was found ill and alone in his cabin when visited by a government trapper, who stopped by the Bull Run store and asked assistance in getting Holden to a hospital.

Authorities said Holden apparently lived alone in his cabin. His companions were three dogs, eight goats and a number of chickens.

Surviving is one daughter, Mrs. Nellie Williams, Auburn, N.Y. The body will be sent to New York.

Farm Census to Start in Sandy

Questionnaires for the 1954 Census of Agriculture will be mailed to farmers in the Sandy area the last week of October, announced Field Supervisor Don C. Mote.

The forms should arrive about a week ahead of the date when enumerators will begin the field canvass on Nov. 3. The advance mailing is for the purpose of giving farm operators time to consult their records before filling in the answers required by the questionnaires and getting them ready for the canvass enumerators. The procedure is designed to insure greater accuracy of reporting and to save time both for the farmer and the enumerator when the latter calls at the farm.

The 1954 census will yield information on number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock, selected facilities and equipment (television, food freezer, piped running water, tractors, trucks, etc.), selected expenditures, and other detail. On the average each farmer is asked about 100 questions, many of which can be answered by simply checking "yes" or "no".

The census headquarters for the local area is located at the Benton County Court House, Corvallis.

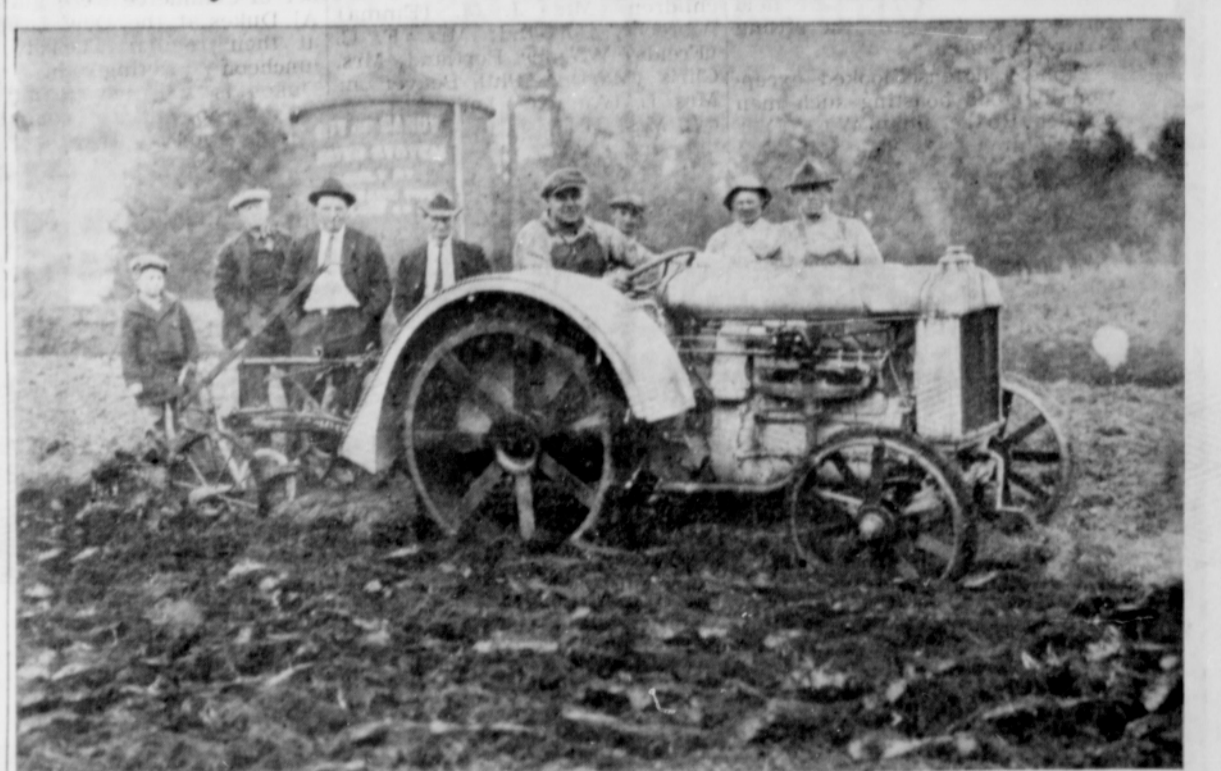
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Community Church Wins Sear-Roebuck Award
