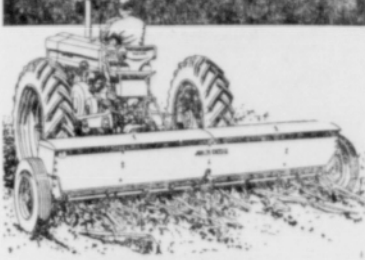


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Here and There around The Sandy Area

Pioneers Close Pre-League Sked With 70-40 Win

Sandy's Pioneers finished the pre-season basketball schedule with a thumping 70-40 victory over the visiting Stevenson, Wash. Bulldogs December 30.

Coach Ken Servas' crew pounded the hoop for a fabulous .449 shooting percentage, hitting 31 of 69 attempts. Servas also was pleased with the rebounding work of his forward wall of Leon Nilsen, Jim Griffin and Floyd Rohde, who grabbed 16, 13, and 11 rebounds respectively.

The Pioneer subs showed a great deal of improvement also as they picked off 22 rebounds and displayed better defensive strength.

Nilsen was high point man for Sandy with 16 while Rohde and Griffin each scored 11. Others scoring for Sandy included Schmitz 8, Skala 7, Flynn 7, Young 4, Anderson 4, McVey 2.

The Stevenson victory gives the Pioneers a 2-win, 5-loss record in pre-league play.

Sandy's JV's won the preliminary contest from the Stevenson Juniors 59-29. Gene Garret scored 22 points for the victors.

Pioneer Scorers Topped by Nilsen As League Begins

Leon Nilsen topped the Sandy high Pioneers scoring column for the seven pre-league basketball games, according to figures released by Coach Ken Servas Tuesday.

Nilsen has scored 30 field goals and 19 free throws for a total of 79 points, an average of slightly more than 11.2 per game. He is followed by Jim Griffin with 66 points and Gary Skala with 53.

Nilsen also can claim title as the team's "bad boy" as he has been whistled for 20 rule infractions. Runnerup honors go to Skala with 17.

IOOF Lodge Completes Portion of Extensive Remodeling Program

One phase of the remodeling program at the Sandy IOOF hall was completed this past week when Dr. Charles L. Brown, chiropractic physician, moved into the newly finished office located in the lower front portion of the IOOF building on Main street.

High School to Hear Game Representative On Fish Conservation

Will Oregon have fishing in the future? This question will be considered when Austin Hamer, education agent for the Oregon Game Commission, discusses fisheries management at Sandy high school today.

The 20-minute chart-illustrated talk points out the requirements for the preservation of fish life and the problems which must be overcome in the proper management of this valuable resource. Following the talk, a sound, color movie, produced by the Oregon Game Commission, entitled "Trout Story" will be shown. The film tells the story that fish hatcheries play in relation to over-all fisheries management.

This is the third in a series of conservation programs being presented to students throughout the state by game commission personnel. Previous programs at Sandy high were on basic conservation and big game management.

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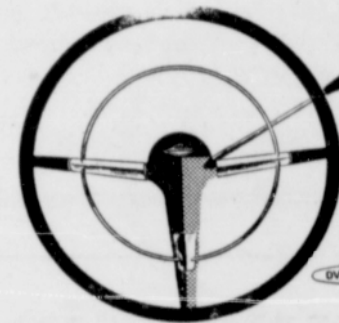
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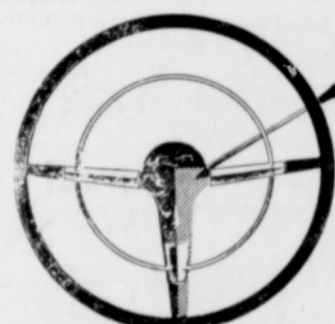
NEW "TURBO-FIRE V8" WITH STANDARD TRANSMISSION



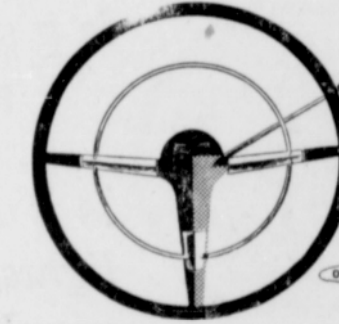
NEW "TURBO-FIRE V8" WITH OVERDRIVE



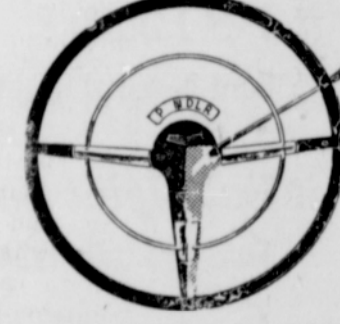
NEW "TURBO-FIRE V8" WITH POWERGLIDE



NEW "BLUE-FLAME 123" WITH STANDARD TRANSMISSION

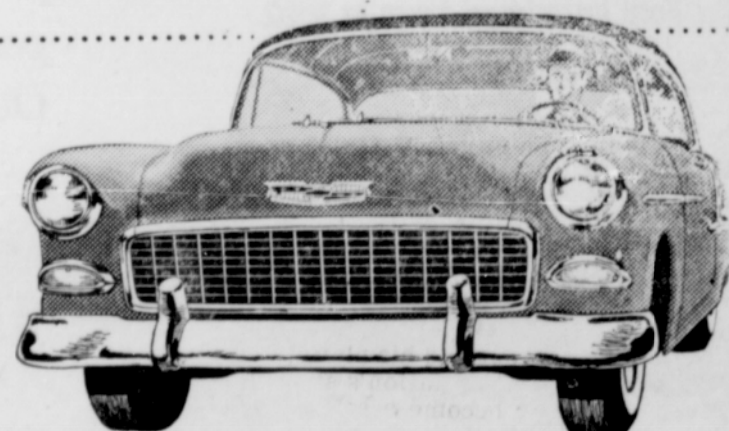


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
