Demonstration on Houseplant Care Given at Brightwood Unit

This demonstration was given at the last meeting of the Brightwood Extension Unit to show how to care for and enjoy houseplants.

There were three soil mixtures made. (1) Sandy soil: 1/2 sand, 1/4 leaf mold, 1/4 soil. (2) Compost soil: 1/2 sand, 1/4 leaf mold, 1/4 soil. (3) Organic soil: 1/2 peat moss, 1/4 leaf mold, 1/4 soil. This was passed around so that the unit members could feel the various soils.

Potting was also shown. Some of the soil mixtures were placed loosely in the pot. The soil was pressed firmly into the pots using the thumbs. The pot was then turned upside down and tapped on the edge of the table removing the soil to show how it retains its shape. It was also demonstrated how to plant a cutting.

Re-potting Plants
Repotting was also done with a pot-bound plant. It was really surprising the root system that some of the plants can have.

Watering was demonstrated by the three soil mixtures that were made. A small amount of water, the same amount was added to each glass, and the members observed the moisture work its way through the soil and noted which soils held the most water.

Containers
Containers and pot wrapping were discussed. The size of clay pots are measured by top diameter in inches. A hole in the bottom for water drainage is necessary. With the planters over watering is always a danger because of lack of drainage. Whereas, in pots lack of water is usually the cause of plant failure.

Fertilizer
The three most often used fertilizer elements are nitrogen (N), phosphorus (P), and potassium (K). The analysis is always expressed in percent. Therefore, a 4-12-4 fertilizer such as "Vigoro" represents 4% N, 12% P and 4% K. Calcium (Ca) or sulphur (S) are other elements that plants use. Sulphur is used to make a soil more acid and calcium to make it less acid. Nitrogen makes the plant green. Phosphorus is used when plants are soft and don't stand up. Potassium is plentiful in the west. Always follow directions on the package when using strong fertilizers.

Insect Control
All insecticides are poisonous and should not be left where children can get them.

Leaf and stem cuttings were also shown.

A "Guide to Care of Houseplants" was given to each member. This shows the light, water, temperature, soil, life span and scientific name of the houseplants.

These are just some of the things that the Extension Unit has for its members. Next month on Feb. 10, Ready Mixes will be demonstrated. Do plan to attend.
