Two Suits Filed Against County During Week

OREGON CITY—Two suits have been filed against Clackamas county during the last week.

One of the suits was filed by the Jones Lumber corporation. The firm asks \$16,500 damages in the complaint which claims that Clackamas county did not own a portion of property sold at auction by the county to the Jones Lumber corporation.

A second suit was filed Tuesday by the federal government to get easements from the county for the construction of a fish ladder on Eagle Creek. The

The Jones firm asks for a rate of \$16,500 on the \$55,000 selling price.

On schedule for bids which are to be received April 13 at 9 AM by the State highway commission are the widening of 82nd street between Multnomah county and Flavel street in Clackamas county; the overpass over the railroad at Clackamas; metal guardrails for five miles of roadway on the Cascade highway between Silverton and Marquam, and the paving and grading of Hart avenue at Seventh street in Molalla.

The cost of the four-lane 82nd street construction job will run up to \$480,000 and the overpass at Clackamas will cost \$163,000.
