### Partnership Advantages Outlined During Rotary Talk On John Day By Gen. Walsh

OREGON CITY—Reasons for the construction of the John Day dam under the partnership plan were outlined by General O. E. Walsh in an address before the Oregon City Rotary club Wednesday noon. In the partnership plan the speaker said, the government builds the dam as a fed-

eral project and uses funds which local interests and persons wishing to invest in them may make available.

General Walsh said that, although there might be a surplus of power in the Northwest in the next few years, by 1960-61 there would again be an insufficient supply of power and none available to new industries. The speaker said it would take ten years to build John Day dam.

As to atomic power replacing hydro-electric power, the speaker said it's feasible but it would not be produced at the low cost of water power. He said that the John Day dam would be integrated into the northwest power pool.

Aneurion Hughes, exchange student at Oregon City high school, who is returning to his home in Wales within a few weeks, gave an inspiring oration on "I Speak for Democracy." Samuel Edvard, representative of the Association of Cement

workers, whose home is Bombay India, talked briefly of the urgency of all peoples of the world working for peace. "Peace in the world means that me and my children are as safe as you and your children." He implored his Rotary audience to continue its work in World Brotherhood. Robert Parks brought greetings from his state of Pennsylvania.

### Industrial Job List Up In County

OREGON CITY—Industrial employment made rapid strides during May to bring the list of estimated unemployed down to 950, 200 below last year's May figure and 350 below April. It was reported by the Oregon City branch of the Oregon State Employment Service. Logging, lumbering, construction, textiles and box manufacturing led the list of industries recalling or hiring new workers, the report said. Agriculture contributed its share to employment with considerable activity in the berry fields.

Construction picked up during the month until practically all carpenters and laborers were employed. Logging and lumbering also picked up with employees returning to work following winter closures. Jobs for women increased during May, particularly in stenographic and clerical lines.

Unemployment claims dropped more than half during May and the itinerant service at Molalla and Estacada and Sandy was discontinued.

Recent high school graduates are on the look out for employment, the report revealed, with some wanting permanent jobs and other summer work until school starts in the fall.

### Starts Road

OREGON CITY—Heavy construction on the 20 foot hard surface road along Oatfield Road was started Wednesday, according to County Commissioner Stan Skoko who said the land for the right of way has now all been procured.

Skoko said the county court was in receipt of an opinion from the District Attorney that it is possible for the budget committee to raise any individual item on the county budget 10 per cent of the over-all budget following the public hearing in July.

### Parking Ruled Out Near Park

GLADSTONE—Parking on the side of Clackamas Boulevard at Cross park along the Clackamas river at Gladstone will be prohibited at all times, it was voted at a meeting of the Gladstone city council Tuesday evening. Parallel parking will be instituted across the highway at the Three Way grocery store and is effective from Cornell street to the bridge.

The council ratified an agreement with the state highway department for the improvement of Clackamas Boulevard from Highway 99E to Portland avenue.

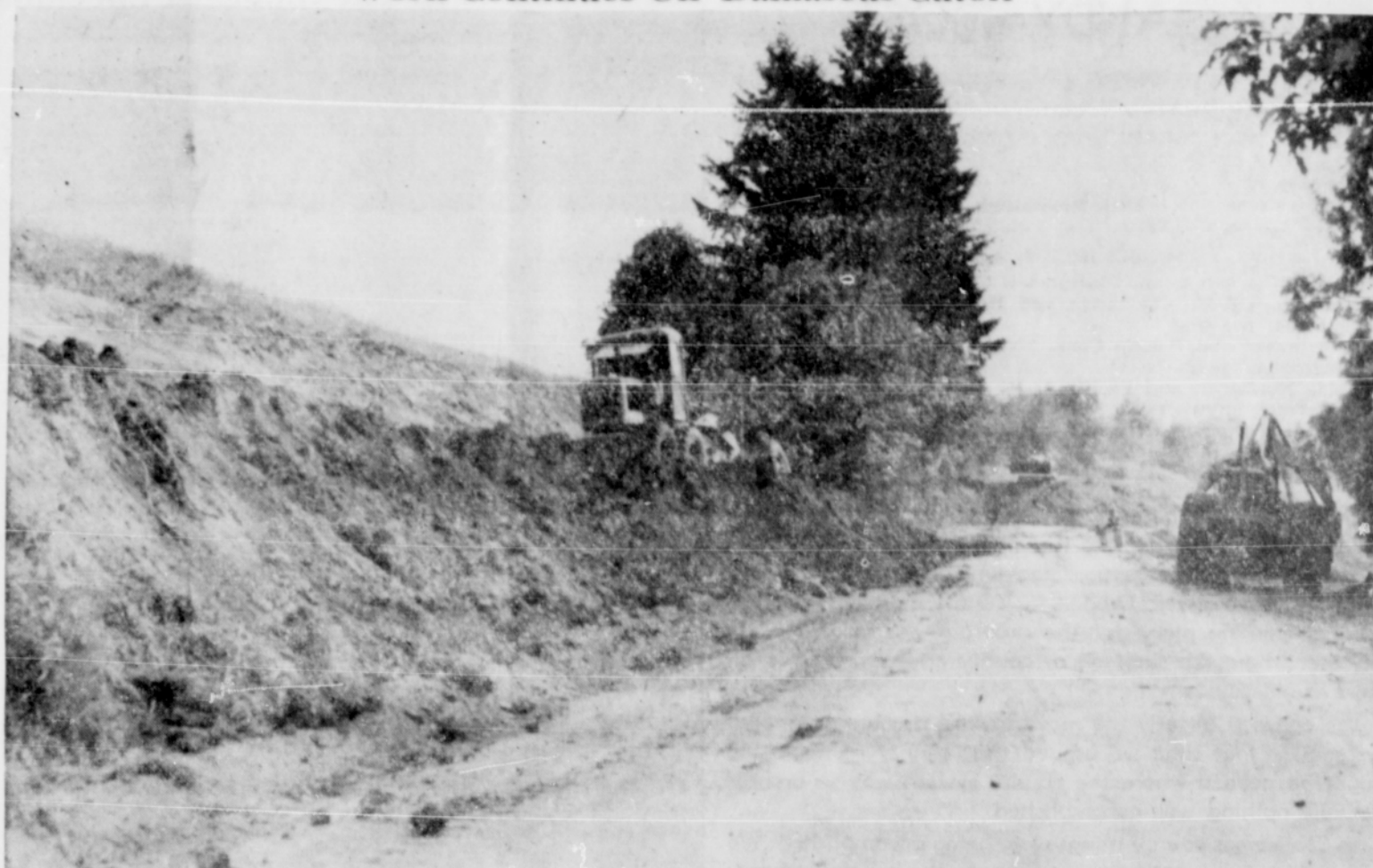
Named to the assessment committee for the curbing of certain streets in Gladstone were Councilmen Hatton, Jones and Boyer.

### Fire Budget OK'd

OREGON CITY—The budget for the Clackamas County fire department which is Fire zone 2 was allowed by the county budget committee in the amount of \$29,701.52 which was the amount requested by the department which has six employees including the county fire chief. The budget for the coming year is \$1,000 under last year's budget, according to Judge Wallace R. Telford.

### Work Continues On Damascus Cutoff



DAMASCUS—Work on straightening and widening of the Damascus cutoff to Rock Creek will be completed in September, according to the state highway department. The \$148,125 job is a joint county and state project. The pavement will be widened to 20 feet and several turns have been taken

out of the lower end of the highway. Last year the state completed the road from Damascus into Boring. About four miles remains to be done. Contractor for the project is K. F. Jacobsen & Co., Portland. The road is the shortest route from the Mt. Hood area into Oregon City and south on 99E.

### Civil Defense Test Run Shows Lack Of Food In Canby

OREGON CITY—Had it been a real bomb which fell on Portland Wednesday, instead of the imaginary one in the civil defense exercise and should you have been one of the 27,000 persons evacuated from Portland to Canby, there is a 50-50 chance you would have gone hungry.

H. F. Jackson, Clackamas county civil defense director, said an evaluation of the exercise shows

there was only enough meat and vegetables in Canby for Irish stew for about half the number which might have poured into the small community. All householders in Canby who were at home were contacted by telephone to see how much food they had on hand available for emergency use.

The two doctors in Canby were unable to handle the number of ill and hurt persons which the exercise determined might have been expected and reinforcements from the Clackamas county public health office were called in.

An accurate test on the amount of radioactive fallout which might have expected was made, Jackson said.

Communications proved satisfactory, according to the civil defense director, who said the exercise in Clackamas county was highly satisfactory. About 28 people worked during the exercise.

J. King Shank, Oswego, has been appointed assistant civil defense director by Jackson.

### Baton Twirlers Set OC Festival

OREGON CITY—The Northwest Baton Twirlers contest is scheduled in Oregon City Saturday, July 30, it was announced Wednesday by Clint Mansfield, manager of the Oregon City Chamber of Commerce. The contest is scheduled to begin at 12:30 PM with the crowning of the queen and the talent show in the evening in the auditorium at the senior high school. Baton twirlers from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana will participate, Mansfield said.

### Library Shows Book Use Up

OREGON CITY—The Oregon City public library reports a continued rise in circulation in books, magazines, and recordings with an expected increase of 1200 over the same month one year ago, according to Miss Gladys Dawson, who says many families make it a practice to visit the library weekly as a part of the recreation of the group.

The Oregon City women's club recently purchased a painting of Mt. Hood by Percy Manser, Hood River artist, which will be permanently hung over the mantel at the Oregon City library.

OREGON CITY—In a tight vote Tuesday, the Oregon City budget passed by more than a two to one majority. Of the 140 votes cast 98 were in favor of the budget and 42 against it. The total city budget is \$286,239.50 which is \$11,985.57 in excess of the six per cent limitation.

OREGON CITY—The second round of Salk vaccine is underway in Clackamas county with the first and second graders who received the vaccine first being those who now get their second shots. 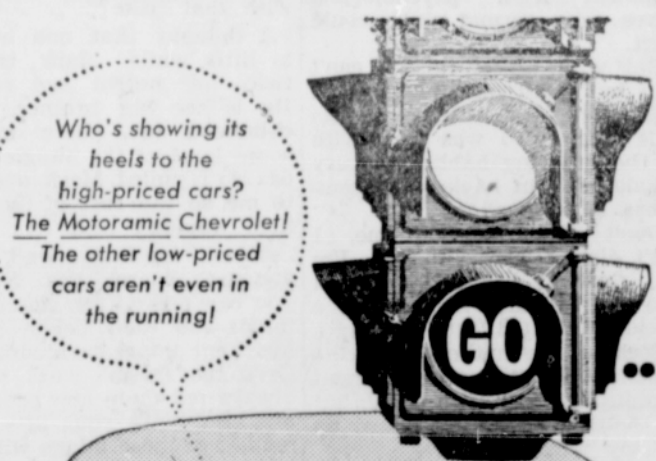
