week, showing clips and scenes from his new movie "The Seven Little Foys." Sunday, Hope appeared on CBS's "Toast of the Town," with a hilarious dance act featuring the seven little ones. Wednesday he showed up at 7 a.m. on Channel 27's Today where he and Dave Garraway exchanged pleasantries. At 10 a.m., same day, same channel, Hope talked about comedy changes since 1935, sang "Thanks For the Memory" and plugged his new show on "Home."

We have never been a rabid Bob Hope fan. In spite of occasional flashes of razor wit he has always seemed to lean too heavily on the double entendre or the suggestive leer for his laughs. On reading his autobiography (Have Tux, Will Travel) we concluded Hope has always been possessed of brashness, suffered very little tribulation and has an eagle eye for the dollar.

Hope's movies played up his effeminate mannerisms, overplayed his astonishing profile and minimized his singing voice. "The Seven Little Foys," promises to emphasize all good things that are Hope's and to eliminate most of those objectionable.

### Seven Menaces

The film clip shown of the Sullivan show found Hope as Eddie Foy, Sr., hiding his head in a newspaper while seven wild little Foys race through the house on rollerskates and goat-back, sawtable legs, leap through windows. His wife has died leaving him in charge of the kids and the easiest way seems to be plug your ears and let 'em go. His agent persuades him that if the little Foys are to eat and papa not lose his fame, there must be a family act.

Instead of a clip, the famous Foy dance routine was done live. Hope quipped that the seven little actors were chosen from all applicants for their complete lack of talent. They do seem refreshingly lacking in the ham-bone cuteness often found in juvenile actors. Finest thing about the dance routine, done in white tails and white derbies, was its lack of machine-like precision. Moviemakers find it hard to line up seven dancers without making their number a drill by lead soldiers. The seven little Foys stumble, get out of step, drop their hats and take off in several directions.

From the best scenes we saw, it's a different Bob Hope who plays Eddie Foy. If a lot of people like him this way we wish astute business man Hope will find the permanent change lucrative.

There are a couple of new

shows coming premiering this week of more than passing interest. Johnny Carson, another of the fresh new comics, begins his own show at 9 p.m., this Thursday, on Channel 6. Barbara Ruick, an intense blonde sylph, is scheduled as the singer.

"Undercurrent," a series of mysteries and what-have-you, in the tradition of The Vise and Danger, opens at 9 p.m. Friday also on Channel 6. The first show, The House on Judas Street, is kind of a gaslight thriller concerning a young teacher and her hair-raising experiences in a rented room.

Another Oregon newspaperman hits the Big Story Hall award July 1 on Channel 27. Following, by a few weeks, the story of former Enterprise-Courier reporter Day Churchman's television story, Oregon Journal reporter Rolla Crick tells his story of breaking up the baby-selling racket in Portland, Washington and California which flourished during the post-war years.

Working with a special investigator assigned by the district attorney's office, Crick bared the existence of a flourishing baby market that sold infants along the Pacific Coast at prices ranging from \$250 to \$4,000. As a result of the investigation, more stringent regulations were enacted to protect foster parents, desperate mothers and infants.

The July 1 program was written by Larry Warren, Portland writer, based on Rolla Crick's own story.
