Estacada Garden Club Sets Show Time For Fashions In Flowers As Theme

ESTACADA — Garden club members of Estacada are winding up plans to hold a flower show in conjunction with the Old Times Festival to be staged at Estacada Saturday and Sunday, July 30 and 31.

Theme of the show will be Fashions In Flowers. Showtime is set for Saturday 1 - 5 PM and 7 - 9 PM. Sunday 1 - 5 PM, in the basement of the primary department of the Estacada grade school. Mrs. Guy Keller is chairman of the event and Mrs. Arnold Anderson and Mrs. Ray Gordon are co-chairmen.

Eligibility for the show will be (1) competition will be open to all interested local gardeners whether Garden Club members or not; (2) Outside Garden club members are invited to compete in section E, I, J, K and N.

Rules for the exhibitors are (1) all exhibits must be in by 10:30 AM. July 30, and not removed until 5:00 PM July 31; (2) The show will be held in the basement of the Primary Department of the Grade school July 30, 1:00 to 5:00, 7:00 to 9:00 PM. July 31, 1:00 to 5:00 PM.; (3) The building will be open from 3:00 PM to 5:00 PM. July 29 to allow exhibitors to register and place early entries; (4) Only one entry permitted in each section, but you may enter as many sections as you wish; (5) club containers will be supplied and must be used for all entries in the Horticulture division.

(6) Ribbons will not be awarded for inferior flowers though it be the only entry in its section; (7) Ribbon awards of first, second, and third will be given in both divisions. Tri-color ribbons will be awarded best arrangement in show, also for best horticulture. Judges decision will be final; (8) All flowers must be grown and arranged by the exhibitor and when possible, labeled with the correct name; (9) No one except the clerks permitted in show room during judging; (10) The Estacada Garden club assumes no responsibility for damage or loss of property, but will exercise every effort to protect the exhibitors' property.

The show committee urges each Garden Club member to make at least three entries in the show whether it be an arrangement, horticulture, or helping a juvenile make his entry.

Show Schedule

SECTION A — Old Oregon Trail: An old-fashioned floral arrangement in an appropriate container. Native material may be used.

SECTION B — Then and Now: Space approximately 3 by 3 featuring two entries; one old-fashioned and one modern arrangement. (Background and accessories may be used).

SECTION C — Yellow and Orange: An arrangement of yellow and orange flowers in a black container, may be yellow and orange combined, or either color alone. Container may be vase, basket or bowl, but must be black.

SECTION D — Seed Pods, Berries and Foliage: An arrangement featuring seed pods, berries, foliage or dried material; any one kind or a combination in any container. Native wild material may be used.

SECTION E — "What's My Line": Any floral line arrangement.

SECTION F — Visiting Garden Club Arrangement featuring the theme of the show.

SECTION G — Pink and White: An arrangement of pink or white flowers in either pink or white container; but both colors must be used.

SECTION H — Dinner Table Arrangement: an informal dinner table arrangement (set for 10 or 12) using a Patriotic Theme. Accessories may be used.

SECTION I — Me and My Shadow: A large and a small floral arrangement in identical containers.

SECTION J — Congratulations to Mother and Baby: A small floral arrangement suitable for a new mother.

SECTION K — Pouring Containers: A floral arrangement in any kind of a pouring container; pitcher, tea pot, watering

can, etc.

SECTION L — An arrangement in a Bottle: A floral arrangement in a bottle.

SECTION M — A Miniature Arrangement: A miniature, under 3 inches, inclusive of flowers and container.

SECTION N — Wood and/or rock.

SECTION O — Miscellaneous.

SECTION P — Tea Table Arrangement: An old fashioned tea table arrangement to be staged on tea tables in use in The Old Fashioned Tea Room.

Horticulture

A—Roses: (1) 1 bloom (2) 3 blooms (3) Floribundas, 1 stem. B—Lilies: (1) 1 stem. C—Dahlias: (1) 1 large (2) 3 miniatures (3) poms. D—Gladioli: (1) 1 bloom (2) 3 blooms. E—Snapdragons: (1) 3 blooms. F—Hydrangeas (1) 1 stem. G—Larkspur: (1) Best bouquet. H—Best Bouquet: (1) Best bouquet. I—Sweet Peas: (1) Best bouquet. J—Geranium: (1) 1 stalk. K—Fuschia (1) 1 stem. L—Tuberous Begonia (1) 1 stem. M—Sweet Williams (1) 3 stems. N—Miscellaneous: anything new and unusual, worthy of showing.

Juvenile Section

SECTION A—An Arrangement Featuring an Old Time Conveyance: (1) first to fourth grades inclusive. (2) fifth to eighth grades inclusive. (3) high school.

SECTION B—Unusual Container: An arrangement in an unusual container. (1) first to fourth grades inclusive. (2) fifth to eighth grades inclusive. (3) high school.

SECTION C — Horticulture: This material must be grown by the exhibitor. Containers for these entries will be furnished by the Garden Club. 1—Roses (a) 1 bloom (b) 3 blooms 2—Dahlias: (a) 1 large (b) 3 miniatures (c) poms. 3—Glads: (a) 1 bloom (b) 3 blooms. 4—Sweet Peas (a) best bouquet. 5—Nasturtiums: (a) best bouquet. 6—Miscellaneous: (a) anything interesting or different.

RULES

1—Arrangement material need not be grown by exhibitor, but must be arranged by self in container. 2—ribbons only will be given. 3—tri-color ribbons will be given the best arrangement and the best horticulture in the juvenile section.

Washington Vets Can Obtain Bonus Forms In Oregon

Application forms for the Washington Korean veterans' bonus are now available in Oregon. Vere A. McCarty, service officer for the state Department of Veterans Affairs, reported today. They may be obtained from the state veterans' department in Salem and Portland, or from county veterans' service offices.

The bonus, approved by the 1955 Washington legislature, pays \$100 to the veteran of 90 days' service or more, all of which was in the United States; \$150 for service of between 90 days and one year where part of the service was outside this country; and \$200 for service of one year or more where a portion of the duty was outside the United States.

The veteran must have been a Washington resident for at least one year immediately prior to his military duty. Active service must have been between June 27, 1950, and July 26, 1953. Veterans in applying are warned that they must submit a photostatic or certified copy of their DD 214 separation papers, not the original document. This information was inadvertently omitted from the application instruction sheet, according to the Division of Veterans' Compensation in Olympia, which administers the program.

Payments cannot start before January 2, 1956.

Physical And Dental Examinations Required Of Pre-School Children

Parents who have not already arranged for complete physical and dental examinations for children entering school for the first time this fall were urged to do so Thursday by the state board of health.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, pointed out that Oregon school authorities ask parents for records of such medical and dental examinations at the time children first register for school.

He said that whenever possible such examinations should be done in the spring to allow time to complete immunization schedules and any corrective work

which is indicated, but he emphasized that in any event the examination should be completed before the children enroll.

Dr. Erickson also pointed out that many school districts require copies of birth certificates for all new admissions. These copies may be obtained by writing or visiting the state board of health, room 979, 1400 S. W. Fifth Avenue, Portland 1. One dollar should accompany the request for each copy.

Information should include the full name of the child and the parents, and the date and place of birth, to enable state board of health staff members to search the records.
