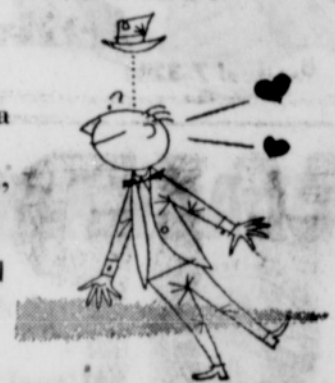
— Scene One - Morning —
