

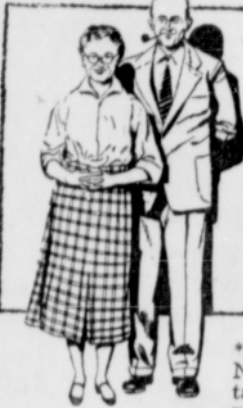

Seven Active TB Cases Discovered During State-Wide Chest Survey

Seven active cases of tuberculosis have been diagnosed as a result of the two months' chest X-ray survey held this summer and two more active cases have been discovered recently by private physicians, reports Dr. Hollister M. Stolte, county health officer.

Five cases picked up in the survey have minimal stage of disease and one is moderately advanced while the two reported by physicians are moderately advanced.

"We like to find the minimal case," Dr. Stolte said, "for the period of hospitalization is relatively short and the patient can be promised a cure if he follows the outlined treatment regime. Whereas in the moderately advanced or far advanced the patient may remain a chronic invalid as a result of his tuberculosis condition."

All nine persons were hospitalized or treatment was begun at home immediately upon reporting to the health department.

Seven cases are men whose ages are 28, 45, 48, 61, 67, 76, and 79. The two women are 38 and 46.

Dr. Stolte and Mrs. Alberta

Cole, supervising public health nurse, commended the cooperation of the physicians of the county for prompt reporting after this year's survey, "for it means," Mrs. Cole said, "early treatment for the patients, follow-up of their contacts and furthering the work of the survey, which is the screening out of tuberculosis."

Mrs. Cole pointed out the accurate reading of the 15,899 miniature films of the survey by Dr. Ambrose S. Churchill, director TB control, state board of health as principal factor in the early diagnosis of the most urgent cases.

A number of people who had X-rays have not reported to their doctors and we are concerned about them for they may be sources of hidden infection, Dr. Stolte said.

"Anyone who signed up for an X-ray," he emphasized, "has an obligation to follow-through, not only to know their own state of health but also to understand better the health picture of the community. It is regrettable that we do not have survey facilities over a longer period to provide adequate follow-up of suspected tuberculosis cases."

The office of the Clackamas County TB and Health association has received many calls since the survey closed from people who wished to get a chest X-ray, reports Mrs. Georgia Farmer, secretary. She stated she was sorry they missed the two units which covered the entire county in the two-month period. Also a number of our residents chose to be X-rayed at the state fair for the 15 persons who were reported to the health department for retake 14 by 17 inch films could only be about one-third of the total number X-rayed there, she said.
