Efficiency On The Railroads

Last year, the American railroads operated with the greatest over-all efficiency ever known. They moved an average of 21,767 net ton miles per freight train hour—the highest average on record. The average speed of freight trains also set a new high record. They handled an average of 69.8 cars per freight train—another record. The average speed of passenger trains also set a new high.

Improvements so marked as these in the operation of a vast and complex industry don't come about as the result of good luck and a pat on the back from the gods of chance. They come about from good management—

from the hard, day-in-and-day-out work of railroad men who have goals in mind and the know-how to reach them.

But good management, important as it is, isn't enough. If it is to reach those goals, it must have the tools to work with—and tools cost money, lots of it. For instance, in the last six years the railroads spent more than \$7,000,000,000 to expand and improve their plant. This money went for cars, locomotives, signal systems, track, and physical facilities of a thousand different kinds. This year the railroads will spend hundreds of millions the same way. The money buys the tools which make possible such records as were established in '54 and more efficient railroading all along the line—Seattle (Wash.) Journal of Commerce
