"The Seven Little Foys," with Bob Hope bedeviled by seven kid actors comes up Thursday, December 1, through Sunday, at the Sandy Theater. Hope plays Eddie Foy, darling of the vaudeville circuits. It promises to be fine light entertainment with a rather-nostalgic background. Hope alone is funny. Hope fighting to upstage seven small scene-stealers should be hilarious.

Another staggering technicolor Cinemascope production is also billed for the weekend at the Sandy Theater. "The Prodigal," is one of Hollywood's Biblical stories.

Lana Turner stars as the goddess of love, Astarte, in pagan Damascus. She descends a flight of 50 steps clad in a few strings of pearls; she ends her career tumbling a couple hundred feet into a flaming pit, clad only in

a different string of pearls. Supposedly based on the story of the return of the prodigal son of Biblical Eli, the movie manages to make the sinful garden of love so enticing, one wonders why Edmund Purdom ever goes home to that fatted calf.

One of the year's most explosive movies appears at Estacada's Broadway Theatre December 4 through 6. James Dean, who was Hollywood's fastest-rising young star before his fatal accident last month, raised a storm of critical acclaim in "East of Eden."

Written by John Steinbeck and produced by Elia Kazan ("Waterfront," "Streetcar Named Desire") East of Eden is a typically raw and earthy Steinbeck story of violent love and hate within a family and a sordid secret.

Co-starring with Dean is another fine young star, Julie Harris, now on Broadway playing Joan of Arc in "The Lark." Raymond Massey plays father to Dean. Also to be seen are Burl Ives and Jo Van Fleet.

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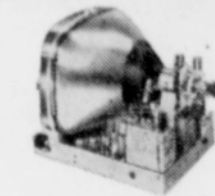

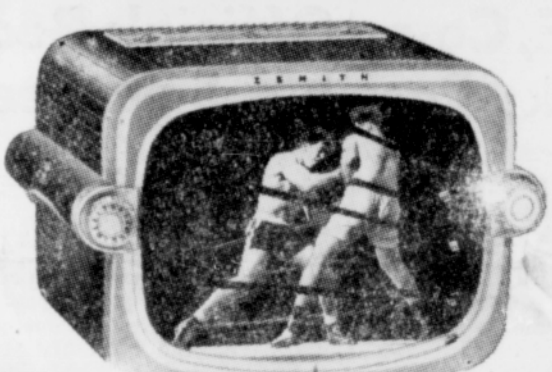
