Scot Missionary Talks On Japan

SANDY—Miss Virginia M. Mackenzie, Presbyterian missionary at home on furlough from Japan, will speak at the Community-Presbyterian church on Sunday, January 22, 1956 at 11:00 AM o'clock.

Born in Scotland, educated in America, and as she says, "made perfectly at home in Japan," Miss Mackenzie has a special love for these great countries. She first went to Japan as a missionary under the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church in 1919. Since then she has taught in five mission schools for Japanese girls. Her longest period of service was at Baiko Jo Gakko, a high school for girls in Shimonoseki, where she has been the principal. So convinced is she of the importance of training Japanese girls that she says, "If the Presbyterian Church had done nothing but reach the young women of Japan, we could still count it a great work indeed, for they are the homemakers, the teachers, the leaders."

During the war years Miss Mackenzie was in the United States, serving as the Presbyterian Board's Secretary in the Central Area for women's work with headquarters in Chicago. As soon as possible after the end of the war she returned to Shimonoseki and her work at the Baiko Jo Gakko.

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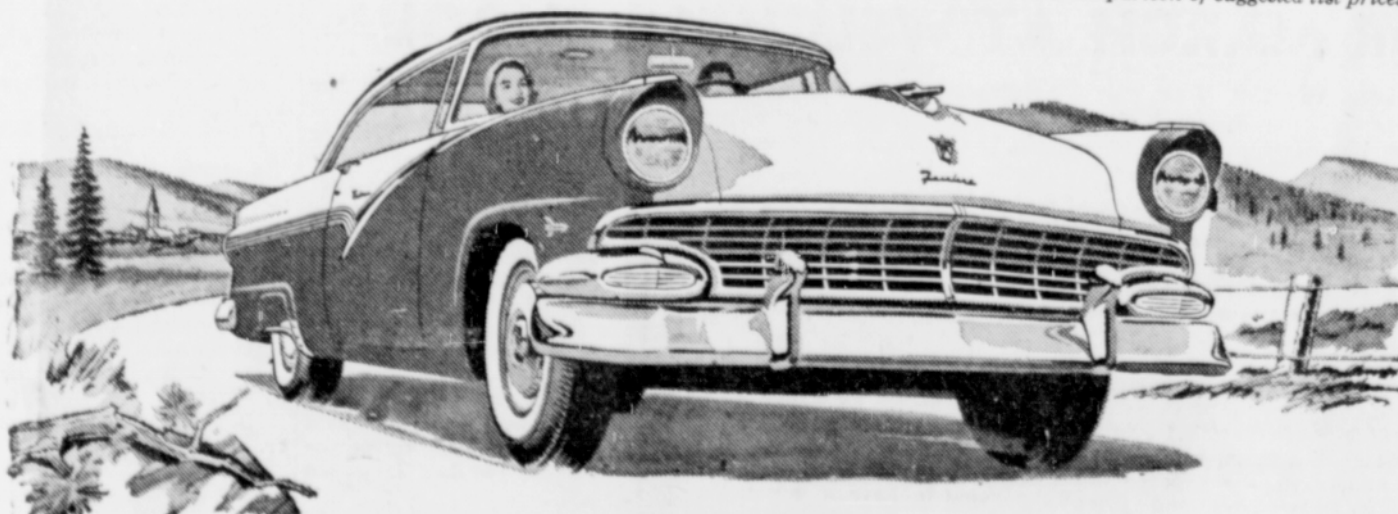
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
