Teacher Surprises Sandy After 30 Years' Absence

SANDY—High school students from the Sandy of 38 years ago were pleasantly surprised to find an old friend in the slight little lady who talked on missions Sunday morning in the Community Presbyterian church. Miss Virginia McKenzie, who told church members of her many years' teaching in a girls' school in Japan, turned out to be the same Miss McKenzie who taught English and Latin to many Sandy residents in the year 1918-1919.

Mrs. Cecil Duke met Miss McKenzie Sunday after a separation of nearly 40 years. As two young ladies fresh out of college, they both began their teaching careers at the old Sandy school, which was both high school and grade school. Mrs. Duke was primary teacher and Miss McKenzie was both teacher and principal of the

high school. "There were two grade school teachers and two high school teachers," Mrs. Duke recalled. "While we were pretty much bound to stay in Sandy since travel was slow, Miss McKenzie and I used to take many walks around the countryside to see the scenery. Once a month there was a community dance but we spent most of our leisure time reading and writing letters."

Miss McKenzie and Mrs. Duke were roommates at a boarding house which was later moved and enlarged to become the former Ivan Barker home. Even then the young schoolteacher was thinking and planning for her work in Japan. After a year in Sandy, she left for that country and continued her teaching there for 30 years, interrupted briefly by earthquakes and fires and for a longer time by World War II.

Although many of Miss McKenzie's students are now scattered there are several people still in Sandy who remember her as a teacher, including Alfred Meinig of Meinig's store and Mrs. John Murray who was then Hazel Beers.

Mrs. Murray remembers Miss McKenzie as one of her most inspired and inspiring teachers. With such a small faculty and student body, the curriculum of Sandy high school then was necessarily limited. But a good teacher can make learning fun, as Mrs. Murray found when she became interested in Latin.

"There was only one year of Latin offered, then," Mrs. Murray says. "But Miss McKenzie knew I was interested so she made me the only advanced Latin pupil and took me on through Cicero and Caesar."

Both Mrs. Murray and Mrs. Duke recall Miss McKenzie as popular both with the students and the townspeople. She took extra time with her students and gave help and interest beyond the demands of her contract.

Plans are already being made for a reunion of all Miss McKenzie's old students and friends. Mrs. Murray told The Sandy Post that her former teacher expects to be back in this area for a longer visit sometime in May. It is hoped that old pictures of the school and classes will be available as well as everyone who remembers the young school teacher whose love for young people was first shown to children of Sandy.

Hostesses Mrs. Bruns, Arleigh Hall and Edna Hall served angel food cake topped with whipped cream and pineapple and coffee for refreshments.



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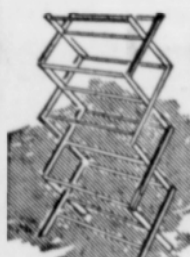
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
