Alert Finds Small Public Interest Here

Auxiliary police, under Bill Blake, handled traffic problems. The women's auxiliary of the Sandy Volunteer Fire department who served as an expert first aid team were Louise Smith, Ellen Steffl, Dorothy DeLong, Helen Dahrens, Phyllis Dryer, Ginger Edes and Billy Williams.

The final stages of the county's part in the nation-wide tests were concluded at the fair grounds in Canby, which had been prepared for the influx of many hundreds of volunteers. Oregon governor Elmo Smith visited the Canby area under the guidance of Clackamas county defense head Hi Jackson. A meal prepared under emergency conditions was served to about 200 people. Jackson estimated that nearly 5000 volunteer workers took part in the county.

Clackamas county was lone in the state in test participation since the city of Portland had supposedly been bombed at 9:45 a.m. with a 100-kiloton A-bomb. Federal agencies had listed simulated attacks on Puerto Rico, Honolulu, Anchorage, plus many mainland cities including Seattle, San Francisco and Portland on the west coast. A simulated evacuation of Canadian cities was also ordered.

In Portland there was no public participation in the alert exercises but TV and FM radio stations left the air for 15-minutes to let Conelrad at 640 and 1240 kilocycles broadcast emergency directions.

In summary of local participation in the simulated alert, CD head Seaman commended the volunteer workers but commented on the apparent disinterest of the public, displayed by the few numbers of private citizens who actually turned up at the Grade School grounds to represent "evacuees."
