

Ban Lifted On Forests; Patrols Still On Burns

SANDY — Hundreds of loggers moved into soggy woods Monday as a two-weeks ban was lifted in the Mt. Hood area and put loggers back to tramping through acres of slick mud. The rains also effectively cleaned up two fire areas above Estacada. However patrols were still vigilant over the embers of

two separate fires involving about 45 acres. The Fish Creek fire area involved about 20 acres of timber and the Indian Ridge fire burned over about 25 acres.

The ban on the forest areas was lifted here Saturday at midnight, according to Bill Ronayne, district forest ranger at Estacada.

Ronayne commented that the forest suffered little damage from fires during the season. So far this summer, Ronayne said, only six fires had caused damage. Besides the two last week, smaller fires during the season had caused some damage at Abbot road and at Bedford Point.

"We have been extremely fortunate this year," Ronayne said. "We have had excellent cooperation from the logging crews in the area and from sportsmen and others in the forest too."

Hopes Slight For Recovery At Timothy

TIMOTHY MEADOWS — Hopes that the body of Kenneth H. Johnson, 28-year-old Colton logger might float on the surface of icy Timothy Meadows lake diminished here this week as the ninth day passed without any sign of the corps.

Johnson drowned Saturday, September 1, in a boating mishap on the reservoir behind the regulating dam. Crews of Portland General Electric company, civil defense teams, and police squads have been diving and searching for the body since then.

Skindivers earlier in the week brought up two fishing poles and a first aid kit which belonged to Johnson and his father-in-law, Robert Little, Colton.

Little was with Johnson at the time of the accident — the first on the man made lake since it was opened to the public this summer.

Clackamas county coroner Les Peake said under normal circumstances the body would have surfaced before the nine days. However, he pointed out that the lake was filled with snags and the body may have been entangled on the bottom.

Road Deaths At High Mark

Forty-five people were killed in Oregon traffic accidents last month, boosting the eight-month traffic toll to 269, the Oregon Traffic Safety Commission reported today.

The 45 August deaths, a figure which officials called "strikingly tentative," is the highest recorded for any month so far this year. The eight-month count of 269 represents seven more deaths than were reported for the same period last year.

The Commission's chairman, Warne H. Nunn, said two Southern Oregon accidents, each of which killed five people, were responsible for boosting the August count upward.

"If those two accidents had been avoided," he commented, "the August count would have been a relatively low 35."

Nunn also noted that Oregon experienced a "good" Labor Day weekend with "only" four deaths in traffic as compared with seven for the same holiday in 1955.
