Unemployed Workers Hit State High

SANDY — Approximately 10,000 workers were laid off by Oregon firms last month, according to reports from 26 local offices of the state unemployment compensation commission. Officials estimated 25,400 workers were looking for jobs November 1, comparing with 15,500 a month ago and 21,000 last year.

Although seasonal unemployment was increasing in nearly every section of the state, most of the layoffs came in downstate Western Oregon. About 2,000 were added to the unemployed in the four-county metropolitan area.

Early snow and cold weather in the higher elevations were given as the cause for most of the lumber and logging shutdowns, but lowering demand for wood products also was noted. Construction, food processing, and other seasonal lines also contributed to the job slackening.

Payments to insured workers also rose noticeably. Benefits sent out during October were 50 per cent higher than the \$492,000 paid a year ago. About half of the difference was due to increases in the new benefit schedule. Weekly payments now average around \$26 as compared with \$22 under the former scale.
