Pioneers Take Second Win In Grunt and Groan Circuit

Coach Bob Woodward's Pioneer wrestling squad grunted and groaned its way to a second win when they defeated West Linn, 25 to 23, at Sandy high in a Wednesday afternoon match.

Harry Woody, Sandy heavyweight threat, posted the victorious points when he pinned Chuck Star in 1:18 in the first round.

Terry Spahr, in the 95-pound division, pinned the opposition's Elmer Hinkle. The other point-winner who pinned his man was Dale Clark, 127 pounds, over Garnet Melvor, WL.

Norman Ralston, WL, pinned Dick Freshour, S, and Arch Woodward, Sandy's basketball manager, was pinned by Jerry Instenes.

The heavily favored Pioneer squad took a cut in confidence Monday when it dropped a 31-19 decision to Beaverton's Metropolitan League matmen in Oregon City. Coach Woodward said he figured it didn't hurt his boys much since they needed a shaking-up to bring them out of their heads-in-the-clouds attitude after winning the first decision of the year over Oregon City.

Monday's match against Beaverton found the Pioneers minus a few regulars because of weight difficulties and the boys were forced to wrestle up one or two weights in many matches.

Larry Hallgran, Bob Konsella and John West battled to draws with only Charlie Sidebottom, Jack Fitzgerald and Harry Woody posting wins.

Ron Luch, B., pinned Arch Woodward in the second round, but Arch was in front 2-0 after the

first three minutes. The Sandy basketball manager had only four wrestling practices and one previous match before the battle.

Woody's five-point victory came in the heavyweight match when Beaverton's Mike Klein was disqualified after using three illegal holds.

Jerry McLain, Sandy freshman, was pressed into action against Bill Leise, when Dale Clark, the 127-pound regular, couldn't make the weight.

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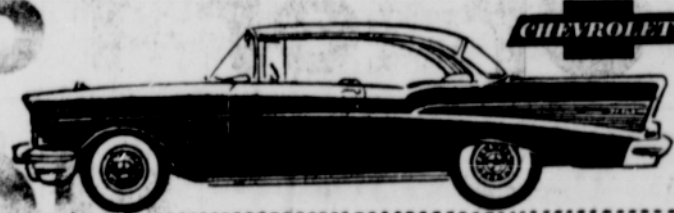
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
