The Community-Presbyterian Church held an officers' retreat last Monday evening, February 18, at the Chapel of the Hills. The Lake Grove pastor de-Guest speaker and discussion leader was Reverend Donald J. Peterson, pastor of the Lake Grove Presbyterian Church, whose theme for the evening was "What is the Church?" The Lake Grove pastor defined the church as "those people throughout the ages who have consciously sought a God-

centered life . . . that the people of the Old Testament are as much a part of the church as those people who have and are living in the New Testament era."

The church officers divided into two groups for the task of examining the question "How can we strengthen Christ's Church?" They reached the conclusion that a beginning with stronger spiritual individuals were needed to develop a stronger church.

Reverend Peterson concluded, "a mature religion is not an individual religion . . . We never have a religion to ourselves, but always in relation to God and in association with our fellow-men."
