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Change Reported Overdue On Tax

Change in the federal corporate structure won't help many small businesses, since most small businesses aren't corporations and don't pay this tax, a national business organization asserted today.

According to the National Association of Manufacturers, which is looking into various proposals in Congress for revision of the federal corporation tax laws, tax revision is needed but it must come in both corporate and individual rates to help small business.

"The latest available government figures show that 86 per cent of the businesses in the country are not corporations, with most of these being partnerships and proprietorships. The owners of businesses in these two categories pay individual income tax on their profits, not corporation taxes," the NAM pointed out.

In 1955, there were an estimated 4,182,000 firms in operation and only 564,000 of them were corporations, the NAM stated.
