Combine 2 cups sugar; 1/2 cup cocoa; 1 cube oleo and 1/4 cup milk in a saucepan. Bring to a rolling boil until the soft-ball stage.

Stir in 3 1/2 cups quick oatmeal and nuts (any amount) if desired. Set aside for 10 minutes.

Drop by spoonfuls on waxed paper.
