Low Demand Still On In Mill Lumber

The slight improvement in prices for green lumber reported last week still continues, but the market is still handicapped by lack of demand, according to Random Lengths, Eugene weekly lumber market letter.

Although mills are holding to their new price levels, and report some selling, it is still unlikely that current inventories and production can be moved entirely.

Even if demand were to pick up sharply, most mills feel it would be some time before any price advances would be felt at the mill level.

Stud prices continue to show firmness, largely due to low volume production.

Continuing buyer interest has been reported by mills shipping mixed cars of green and kiln dried lumber, but some report a slight slowdown from two weeks ago as buyers wait for definite market trends to develop. Most sales are made to fill immediate needs or gaps in unbalanced inventories.

Although pine production is below par, most mills have been selling their output, and maintain fair unfilled order files. For the past several months, sales have exceeded production, and prices, particularly in the wider widths of Number 2 and better and 3 grades have shown considerable strength.

Demand and supply in the Plywood market is fairly well balanced as a result of curtailed production. A number of plants reported a pick-up in inquiry this past week, but so far none of those who shortened their working weeks to four days, have indicated they will resume normal schedules.

Diseased Meat Found In Oregon

Animals condemned under the pilot meat inspections recently concluded in 12 plants in Washington, Yamhill, Polk and Marion counties represented 1.85 per cent of the total slaughter in the two weeks of the study. This is the highest figure yet recorded for a single period of the pilot inspections, according to M. E. Knickerbocker, animal division chief of the state department of agriculture. This study did not include all plants in the four counties.

In these plants, 810 animals were slaughtered. One was condemned on ante-mortem inspection and 14 on post-mortem inspection. Animals condemned as unfit for human consumption were nine cattle, four sheep and two hogs. The causes ranged from emaciation to cancerous conditions.

The percentage of livers (25 per cent) was not as high as in some of the pilot studies. Eight-tenths of one per cent of all heads crew the state condemned tag. Chief causes of liver condemnations were fluke and parasites.
