

October UF Goal Is Set

Goal of the 6th annual United Fund-Red Cross campaign, slated for October, was set at \$3,170,000 for the tri-county area at a meeting of the Fund board Tuesday, May 28, at the U. S. Bank in Portland.

Meeting with the Multnomah County Fund directors were Harold R. Holmstrom, president of the Clackamas county United Fund, and Edwin L. Jenkins, Washington county Fund president.

Clackamas county goal is tentatively set at \$112,000 and Washington county, at \$95,000 subject to formal approval of their respective boards. These goals are included in the tri-county figure of \$3,170,000. The 1957 campaign goal is \$165,426 more than was raised in last year's campaign. Milton Rice, campaign chairman, termed the goal a challenge but "entirely possible of attainment. Believe me, we will do the best we can," Rice declared.

Sandy Man Wins Award

SALEM — "Ten dollars cash will be awarded to a Sandy resident, employed by the State of Oregon, honoring his suggestion that will enhance the administrative procedure for the state fisheries." This announcement was made by Gordon Shattuck, Secretary to the Oregon State Employee Suggestion Awards Board.

Wallace Francis Hublou will be the recipient of ten dollars cash for suggesting the purchase of hand tally counters for each fisheries station to aid in the counting of eggs and fish. Hublou, an Aquatic Biologist II, is employed by the State Fish Commission.

Hublou's suggestion is one of many that bring to the state better work methods. Aside from streamlining administrative procedure, suggestions from employees enhance safety measures, employee morale and generally further the program of improving state government for better public service.

This suggestion is one of seventeen given recognition by the suggestion board during the month of April. A total of \$820 was paid out in cash for winning suggestions that will save the state an estimated \$27,495 annually. According to Shattuck, the month of April brought the "greatest saving to the state at one time since the beginning of the program, less than two years ago." "85,990.41 has been saved annually from suggestions submitted thus far," Shattuck said. \$5,990 has been given out to employees as cash awards since the beginning of the program.

After a late Sunday dinner the young folks still have enough energy left to go out of doors and come back with a good appetite. Mom doesn't feel up to another full meal so here is a good quick dish which is hearty, yet easy to prepare:

CHICKEN SOUFFLE

Preheat the oven to 300 degrees.

1 can of condensed cream of chicken soup

4 eggs separated

Blend together soup and well beaten egg yolks. Beat whites until stiff but not dry and gently fold into soup mixture.

Pour into a greased 1½ quart casserole and bake for one hour. Serve at once with different types of sauce.

One idea for sauce is left over creamed peas. Another is to use one can condensed mushroom soup blended together with ½ cup of milk and heated thoroughly. Left over pieces of chicken can be creamed to take the place of canned soup in the souffle if desired.
