Jobs Coming Very Slowly

Over 15,000 berry pickers will be needed in Clackamas County strawberry fields in June according to a report from Ted Huff, manager of Oregon City's office of the state employment service.

Huff stated that most of these will be housewives, vacationers and youngsters between 12 and 15 years of age and that no one in this group should have any difficulty finding employment in this field.

The outlook for others is a little cloudy, though, at this time of year. Employers point out that they have many applicants for some jobs and yet higher skilled jobs are not being filled. Clackamas County High school for lack of applicants. Over 200 seniors not going on to college have been given aptitude tests and have been carefully screened to help them find the right job and the employer to find the right employee.

A summary of May employment showed a slow recovery from the winter lethargy in logging, woods products manufacturing, and construction work held down re-employment.

Guardsmen To Go For Encampment

Oregon National Guardsmen of the 41st Infantry Division begin their annual summer encampment at Fort Lewis, Washington, Saturday.

Some 6,000 troops will leave cities and towns throughout the state by motor convoy and train early Saturday morning. The summer training period is scheduled from June 15th to the 29th.

Oregon Guardsmen will join forces with over 4,000 members of the Washington National Guard at "tent city" in the north east portion of Fort Lewis.

Assistant 41st Infantry Division Commander Brig. Gen. Frederick L. Wiegand of Beaverton will command the Oregon troops.

Division units which will participate in the training include Hqs. Division Artillery, Brig. Gen. Alfred E. Hintz, commander; 186th Infantry Regiment, Col. Robert L. Irving, commander; 162nd Infantry Regiment, Col. Paul L. Aluver, commander; 162nd Engineer Battalion, Lt. Col. Richard H. Johannsen, commander; 218th Field Artillery Battalion, Lt. Col. Richard S. Panek, commander; and the 955th Field Artillery Battalion commanded by Lt. Col. Roland H. Jensen.

Highlight of the encampment is the annual Governors' Day Review and open house, June 22nd, when visitors from home at Gray Field.

Intensive basic combat and advanced individual training will keep the Guardsmen busy during their 10th annual summer encampment. A new Officer's Candidate School is also on the schedule for 80 enlisted men of Oregon and Washington.
