Ray Allen Parmenter, Route 2, Box 34, Boring, died at his home on June 24. Mr. Parmenter was born April 6, 1890 in Adams County, Nebraska and at the time of his death was 67 years of age. The early part of his life was spent in Kenesaw, Nebraska where he attended school and grew to manhood.

On August 14, 1937 at Hastings, Nebraska he married Miss Thayer McGaw. In 1938 they moved to Portland, Oregon and in 1950 to the Boring area. He was a member of the Christian Church. Mr. Parmenter was a retired farmer and businessman. He had been in failing health for the past year and a half.

July Event Schedule Over Oregon Lists Pageants, Festivals, Rodeos

More than 35 festivals, including the well-known Albany Timber Carnival Molalla Buckeroo, Salem's Willamette River Days and Bend Water Pageant, are listed on the 1957 Oregon Schedule of Events for July.

World championships in five logging contests will be awarded at the Timber Carnival, slated for July 2-4 at the natural amphitheater of Waverly Lake. The contests will be held the afternoons of July 3 and 4.

Cochise, the television Indian, will be making an appearance at the popular Molalla Buckeroo, July 3-7.

Officially sanctioned outboard and inboard motor boat races will be a feature of the second Willamette River Days Festival at Salem, July 3-7. Races will be July 4 and 6, and an aquatic show is scheduled for July 7, all of which will be in the Willamette river at Salem.

Brightly-colored floats will decorate the Deschutes river at Bend for the Bend Water Pageant, July 4-6. A new giant arch, through which the floats will pass, is being constructed for this year.

Among other major events set for July are the Astoria Regatta and Oregon Fish Festival at Astoria July 18-20; the Robin Hood Festival at Sherwood, July 18-20; the Order of the Antelope meeting at Hart Mountain near Lakeview, July 19-21; and the Miss Oregon Pageant at Seaside, July 26-28.

Fourth of July fireworks celebrations will be popular with many Oregon cities. That night fireworks will be touched off at Albany and Salem festivals, and at the Siletz Bay Dock, at Taft; Fourth of July celebrations and fireworks, Harrisburg; Man-

zanita, Medford, Seaside and at Eugene.

Rodeos, which first appeared on the Oregon scene in June, will be at Molalla's Buckeroo, and at the Klamath Basin Round up, Klamath Falls, July 2-4; Paulina Amateur Rodeo, Paulina, July 4; Cottage Grove Rodeo, July 13-14; Elgin Stampede, Elgin, July 20-21; Chief Joseph Days, Joseph, July 26-28; and the Lebanon Roundup, Lebanon, July 26-28.

Also on the schedule for July are the Shrine Circus, Multnomah Stadium, Portland, July 2-6; Happy Days, Hillsboro, July 3 to 5; Aqua Tourney, Willamette River, Portland, July 4; Parkdale Boosters' Parade, Parkdale, July 4; Old Fashioned Celebration, Ashland, July 4.

Vernonia Friendship Jam-boree, Vernonia, July 4-6; Central Oregon Gem and Mineral Show, Bend, July 4-6; Outboard Motor Races, Devil's Lake, De-lake, July 7; American Kennel Club Obedience Trials, State Fairgrounds, Salem, July 14; Sports Car Tour, Eugene, July 14; Dog Racing, Fairview track, Portland, July 15 to October 1; Shetland Pony Show, Eugene, July 17-18.

Fly-In Celebration, Cascade Locks, July 19-21; "Holiday on Ice," Multnomah Stadium, Portland, July 24-31; Agate Show, DeLake, July 27-28; Junior Chamber of Commerce Air Fair, International Airport, Portland, July 28; and Oregon College of Education's 75th anniversary as a state-supported school, Monmouth, July 30.

Buckeroo Slated Over The Fourth

MOLALLA (Special) — A bigger and better show, to run five full days with six arena performances, is promised for the 34th annual Molalla Buckeroo July 3 to 7.

Western Oregon's biggest Western spectacle opens Wednesday evening and continues thru Sunday afternoon with both the matinee and evening performances Thursday, July 4.

Two hundred of the rodeo circuit's top professional cowboys are expected to compete in arena events which will include Brahma bull riding, wild cow milking and trick roping and riding in addition to such standard rodeo events as bareback and saddle bronc riding, calf roping and bulldozing. The famous rodeo stock of Christensen Brothers will be used in Molalla, and only in Molalla on July Fourth.

A gavel fashioned from Oregon's unique myrtlewood will be presented to each of the governors of the states and territories by Governor Robert D. Holmes when he attends the annual Governor's Conference this week in Williamsburg, Virginia.

The foot-long myrtlewood gavel was turned by Duncan myrtle crafters of North Bend and carry a plate with each of the governor's names, engraved by Stevens and Sons Jewelers of Salem.

Governor Holmes said the myrtlewood gifts were particularly appropriate because the southwestern Oregon coast is the only place in the world where the big trees grow. The engraved plate also carries the words Oregon Myrtlewood.

Each of the other 47 state governors and the governors of Alaska, Guam, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands will receive one of the gavel.

Rules Given For Fourth

Oregon safety officials expressed concern today over what might happen to the state's traffic death record over the Fourth of July.

Their concern stemmed from the fact that over the Memorial Day holiday weekend, not generally considered a major travel holiday, 11 people met death in Oregon traffic accidents.

The Department of Motor Vehicle's traffic safety division said even though the holiday falls on a Thursday this year many people will stretch it into a four-day weekend.

Those planning trips over the Fourth, the division said, should follow these four suggestions for a safe holiday:

1. Don't attempt to drive too many miles when time is limited.
2. Stay alert for mistakes of other drivers who may have been drinking.
3. Drive at a reasonable speed remembering that traffic will be heavy.
4. Avoid becoming over-tired before starting home since a tired driver fails to react quickly to unexpected hazards.

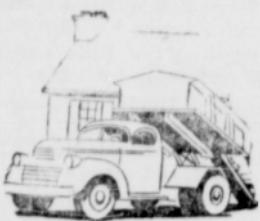
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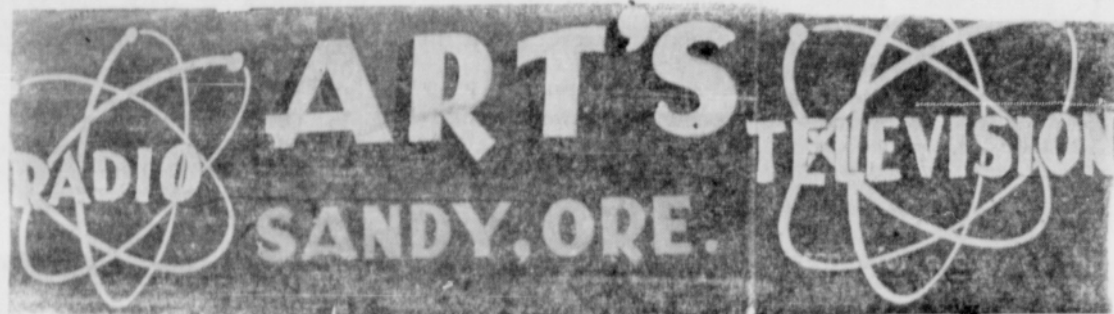
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
