Local Car Dealer
Awarded Citation

Mill Closures Keep Lumber
Prices, Market In Doldrums

The lumber market shows no new signs of life following the traditional Fourth of July mill shutdowns, and prices remain unchanged or slightly lower, according to Random Lengths, Eugene weekly lumber market letter.

Another influence bearing on the Green mill market disappeared last week when threats of a strike among British Columbia coastal mills failed to materialize. Increased freight rates are in the offing, but if the market is still weak at the time the increase will have an adverse effect on the mills.

Studs follow the same market pattern that has prevailed for the past ninety days. Limited production by some mills has enabled them to maintain a steady price level, while those who attempt to maintain normal production have been forced to lower levels.

The green market generally finds a few items surging into a

healthy market position momentarily, then returning to their normal levels. Overall, the green market is soft, and there is general feeling that price reductions will be required to keep production moving.

Mills shipping mixed cars of green and kiln dried lumber anticipate very little market activity until resumption of operations for most being this week. Over the holiday period, demand remained steady, but low in volume.

The pine market shows little change from last week. There is a wide range in prices especially for low grades selects and all grades of commons except No. 2 and better.

The plywood sheathing market continues to hold steady, but sanded stock still moves slowly. Although plants are hopeful that vacation shutdown will strengthen the sanded market, further price reductions may be necessary.

Local Herds
Rate High

One local dairy herd qualified for the county honor roll by producing 40 or more pounds of butterfat during the month of June, according to Hugh Caton, county agent.

The monthly report of Joe Carr, Richard Gale and L. C. Berney, DHIA supervisors, listed the herd of Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Malar of Boring as one of the high-producing herds in Clackamas county. They produced 48 pounds with 31 cows and 4 dry.

The three supervisors also recorded individual cows which made outstanding records of 75 pounds of butterfat or more during the month of April. They are: Fay, Beauty, Jean, Bugsie, and Angie, two registered Jerseys and three grade Holsteins respectively with 84, 82, 81, 121 and 108 pounds respectively, owned by Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Malar of Boring; Hallie, a registered Guernsey owned by Wallace Aschoff, Boring with 77 pounds; Penny, a registered Holstein owned by Mr. and Mrs. Miles Drum, Sandy, with 78

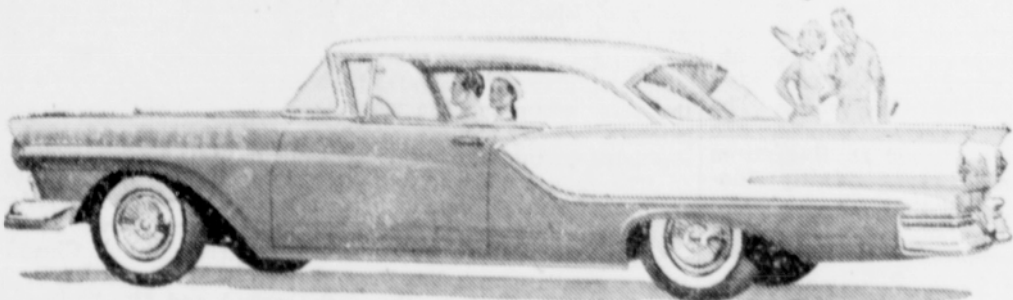

Tickets On Sale
For Ten Rounder

Tickets for the Bobo Olson-Pat McMurtry 10-round fight at the Portland Meadows August 10 will go on sale Wednesday at the office of the Portland Boxing Club, 925 N. W. 19th Avenue, Portland, Oregon.

Not since the days of Harry Mathews have fight fans of the Northwest shown such keen interest in a boxing contest.

The McMurtry followers are predicting a KO win, pointing to Pat's record of 20 knockouts in 26 fights. Pat's only defeat to date has been a loss to Willie Pastrano, who is ranked number 4 in the heavyweight division.

Bobo Olson, former middleweight king, has a big following in the Portland-Vancouver area who think he is a better fighter as a light heavyweight than he was as a middleweight and feel McMurtry does not have the experience to beat the former world's champ.

In his last fight in Portland on June 18, Bobo won a hard fought 10-round decision from Joey Maxim. A win over Irish Pat, who is ranked number nine among the heavyweights, would put Bobo in line for a light heavyweight title match with the winner of the Archie Moore versus Tony Anthony championship fight.

Most experts are picking a decision win for Olson, or a KO win for McMurtry. Olson's greater experience and ring generalship should earn the decision should the fight go 10 rounds, but Irish Pat's tremendous KO punch in either hand could end the affair at any moment.

Hattie E. Armstrong, of Star Route, Sandy, passed away July 17, on Sunday, July 19, at 2:00 p.m. in the Chapel of the Carroll Funeral home in Gresham. Reverend Fletcher Cannell will offer the services. William Elliott is the soloist and Anita Kidder will play the organ.

She was born October 25, 1890 in Watertown, Minnesota. There she spent her youth, grew to young womanhood and attended and taught school.

She was a member of the Congregational Church. Mr. Armstrong died in August 1955. She is survived by two sons, Lorry E. and Russell B., both of Sandy; one grandchild; one sister and two brothers, Pearl Jonsrud of St. Paul, Minnesota; Alf Japs of Aberdeen, South Dakota and Arthur Japs of El Monte, California.

The early part of his life was spent in Illinois, where he attended school and grew up. At about the age of 16, he moved to Oregon, settling in La Grande. He then joined the Army and served overseas in the Hawaiian Islands.

Upon his return he traveled all over the west until 1924 when he arrived in Baker, Oregon. He married Mildred Bagley at La Grande on September 26, 1924. After their marriage they lived in Los Angeles, Portland and St. Helens and in 1941 they made their home in Portland. About 1952 they moved to Sandy which has been their home since.

The surviving members of his family include his wife, Mildred, and two daughters: Mrs. Rex (Elizabeth) Allen and Mrs. Wayne (Barbara) Owens, both of Sandy. There are seven grandchildren. Two brothers and three sisters also survive: Jim Talbot of Redmond, Oregon; Joe Talbot of Los Angeles; Mrs. Vera Norris of Los Angeles; Mrs. Alice Sauford of Baker and Mrs. Edna Lorraine of Hamilton, Illinois.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, July 17, at 2 p.m. in the Chapel of Carroll Funeral home, Gresham. Reverend William Killian offered the services. Cremation was at Portland Memorial.
