Forest Products Prices Fall Low

Strikes among the building trades in major consuming areas are aggravating an already low demand for Northwest forest products, and prices have fallen to their lowest levels in several months, according to Random Lengths, Eugene weekly lumber market letter.

Meanwhile green lumber production continues to outdistance demand, and unless prices stabilize, some mill closures are imminent. Orders come in a dribbling volume, but generally are highly specified and demand quick shipment. Despite a general drop throughout the green mill market, studs hold their stationary market position due to a balance of production with demand.

Even low prices fail to inspire the California board market which has been lifeless for a number of weeks due to building trades strikes in southern California. Timbers and other heavy cutting finds a spotty market, with only the longer lengths receiving any market attention.

Although retail yard buying moves at a dribble, the volume is steady. Mixed car mills shipping both green and kiln dried lumber for the most part have fair order files, although slightly smaller than at this time last year. Odd and short lengths are becoming more difficult to move, as buyers confine their orders to the fast-moving yard items.

Pine sales still exceed production, but this is not reflected in prices. Only the higher grades Selects and commons, mostly in mixed car loadings, are moving in good volume, while growing accumulations in the lower grades encourage price reductions.

Plywood production has not yet caught up with the orders placed during Fourth of July holiday shutdowns, but sheathing demand is off slightly and prices are weakening.

Few Roads Left Unopened on Mt.

All of the roads are open on the Mt. Hood National Forest with the following few exceptions.

Skyline Trail: Open from Columbia Gorge. Most of trail on Bear Springs maintained except from Salmon River to Jackpot. Not completely worked from Lakes.

Timberline Trail: Open approximately August 10th. Wahtum Lake: Road rough between Rainy Lake and Wahtum Lake.

Skyline Road: In good condition as far as Olallie Lake, but rough between Olallie and Breitenbush Lake.

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Charge Changed To Petty Larceny

A preliminary hearing was held last Thursday for Robert Glenn following charges brought against him by his former employer, Jay Pearce of the Wistaria Inn east of Sandy, of embezzling.

On motion of the assistant district attorney in Oregon City the charge was reduced to petty larceny and Glenn plead guilty and was given 30 days imprisonment.

Pearce stated that Glenn had been entrusted with the receipts from the commercial fish pond at the Inn and had used the money for his own devices.

Producers Due Inspections

Meat producers and processors in Clackamas county will, according to a July 31 report from the State Agriculture Department, regulate their operations to a full-time meat inspection program as quickly as pilot inspection crews can set up local laymen to handle the activity.

Slaughter plants in Jackson and Josephine counties are already in the process of complying to the meat inspection law.
