Fair Plans For Grange Underway

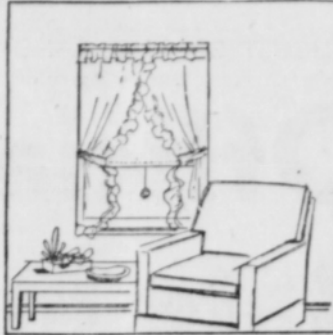
Further plans have been made by the Sandy Grange for their forthcoming fair slated for September 21 from noon until evening.

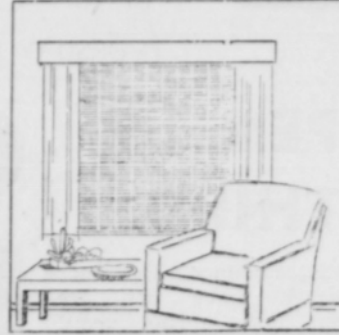

If you have a single, small opening in a wall, you can camouflage the small size with a bamboo blind or window shade extending about two feet on each side of the window. Your draperies can be designed to frame the blind, not the window.

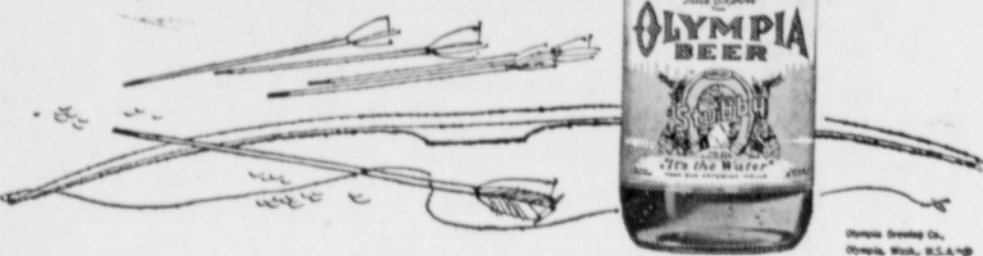
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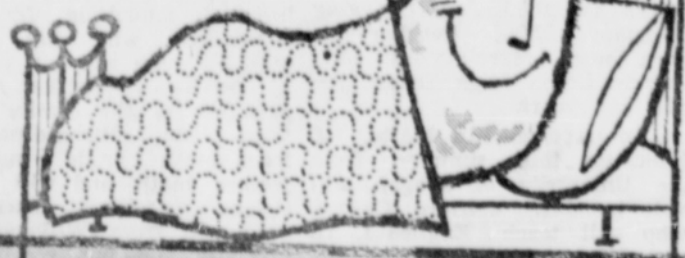
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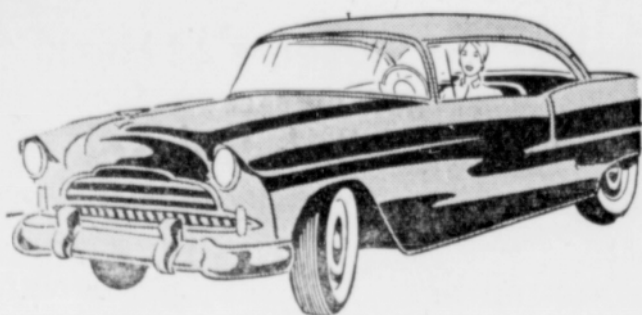


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
