

Concert Calls Sandy Students

CONCERT CALLS 1 col 18
Young music lovers from Sandy, about 75 of them, students from the upper grades and members of the school band, will travel to Portland Saturday for the opening of the Portland Junior Symphony season, according to Mrs. Warren Decker, Sandy. Busses from the school will provide transportation.

Under the direction of Jacob Avshalomov, conductor, the symphony will present compositions by Smetana, Mozart and Bizet and one of the most popular with young audiences, Prokofiev's "Peter and the Wolf".

The special morning concert for even younger audiences, presented on Saturday morning beginning at 11, will present excerpts from the evening program with commentary by the conductor and demonstration of instruments.

The 1957-58 junior symphony season includes concerts on February 15 and on April 19 at the Portland Public Auditorium. Student prices for evening concerts are 50 cents for orchestra seats and 25 cents for the balcony seats, Mrs. Decker noted.

The driver told investigating officers that the boy had raced across the highway directly into the path of his car and it was impossible for him to avoid striking the youngster. Vuylesteke was not held.

With two older brothers, Robert, aged 11, and David, aged 10, Stephen had been picking up bottles along the Mt. Hood highway when the fatal accident occurred. The Sandy ambulance was called but the boy was dead before arrival at the hospital.

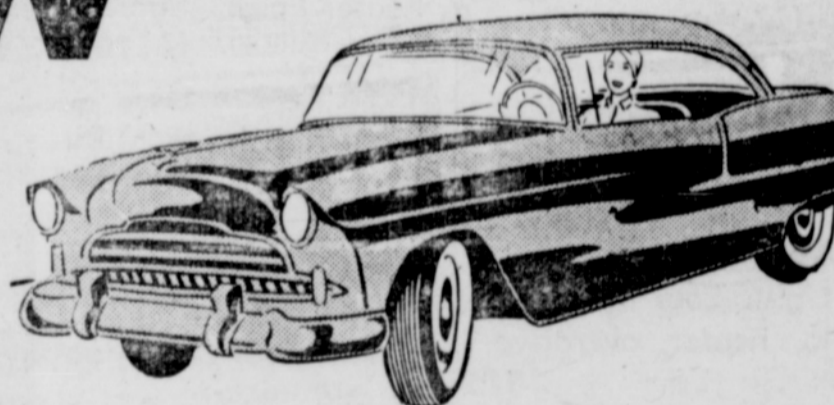
Last Monday's meeting saw four patrols formed, named and patrol leaders named. One week previous the troop members were tested in swimming.
