Belton Outlines Aims Of Special Capital Term

The Special Session of the Oregon State Legislature adjourned sine die at approximately 7 PM. Friday, November 15. A brief review of the cause and effect might prove timely and helpful.

When the regular session adjourned six months ago it was anticipated there would be a surplus of 9 million dollars at the end of the 1957-59 Biennium, June 30, 1959.

The Income Tax Bill enacted at the 1957 regular increased revenues materially. This together with a sizeable error on the part of the Tax Commission staff led to the Governor's call for a Special Session on August 24, just a few days after the new realistic withholding forms were mailed out. The Governor proposed the Income Tax payments be discounted 6 per cent and the Basic School appropriation be increased by \$10 per census child to reduce the anti-surplus by 17 million dollars.

When the Legislature convened on October 28, the recommended tax discount was increased to 10 per cent. House Bill One was introduced and promptly passed by the Lower House by request of the Governor, to effect the tax change.

A bi-partisan majority in the Senate Tax Committee amended the bill to effect a 30 per cent reduction in the Income Tax rates. The fifteen Republican members of the Senate supported the 30 per cent rate reduction and House Bill One passed the Senate by a vote of 17 to 13 on November 7. The House refused to concur in the Senate amendments and three successive conference committees spent a week in reaching a compromise agreement.

House Bill One, as finally passed, will mean a 25 per cent cut in tax rates in the lower brackets and approximately 18 to 20 per cent across the board. It will leave a surplus of 31 million instead of the 58 million proposed by the Governor and the 10 to 20 million sought by the Senate Republicans.

The passage of House Bill One will result in new withholding forms being distributed to employers as soon as the rates can be computed and the forms printed. The Bill also makes provision for loss carryover and accelerated depreciation, both of which should offer inducement to new job-producing industries. These two provisions are expected to result in a reduction of the surplus by about 3 million

dollars out of the 37 million total reduction.

House Bill Two, increasing the Basic School Fund by \$10 per census child, was passed by the House and likewise amended in the Senate. The amendment which was finally adopted and passed will insure full property tax offset with the added appropriation.

Senate Bill One which passed the Senate with only one negative vote was also approved by the House in the final hour of the session. If signed by the Governor it will repeal the 6 mill automatic state property levy.

No new appropriations were made in spite of the bills introduced which would have expended in excess of forty million dollars. Bills were passed to legalize some 180 rural fire protection districts, and an unknown number of zoning districts declared invalid by a decision of the Supreme Court since the regular session adjourned.

Legislation was passed to enable the Government Camp Sewer District to finance the installation of a sewer system and treatment plant much needed in that area of limited valuation.

A bill was passed to permit the continued operation of the Lake Grove Park facilities by the board of the Oswego Consolidated School District without violating the provisions of the local budget law.

Now that adjournment has been reached it remains to be seen what the Governor will do with the legislation as passed by the legislature. He may sign the several bills into law or he may let them become law without his signature. His third alternative is to wield the veto axe. It is the hope of the Republican minority who sponsored the increased tax reduction program that the veto will not be exercised.

Again, it has been a pleasure to serve as your State Senator, and I sincerely hope the substantial tax relief bills passed will prove beneficial.

Dick Revenaugh The SHANTY

Mrs. Robert Bunnell Monday turned over to us for reading and gasping a publication which the great New York City daily newspapers would give their eye teeth to come by. It's the Friday, November 7, 1783 issue of the New York Morning Post,

edited by Morton and Horner, at No. 7 Water Street, between the Coffee House and Slip. In it are orders from the Commander in Chief (George Washington) that no one in the city is to demolish one or brick buildings until their true ownership can be determined, a proclamation from the commander in chief of the Majesty's Forces within the Colonies, lying on the Atlantic Ocean from Nova Scotia to West Florida, in "five." The British Commander proclaims that an embargo has been committed on an American vessel 'in the harbour of this city, by seizing and deftroying her colours in a riotous and disorderly manner, which behavior is not only a breach of the peace of the city, but has mischevously a tendency to prolong the calamities, which it is the design of the Provisional Articles to affuage and extinguish."

The little four-page paper backed to the hilt with advising... much of it legal fees. Among the most interesting: "A woman with a breaft of milk would be to take a nurfe child in houfe. She can be well mended. Enquire of the mters."

And: "FOURTEEN DOLLARS REWARD. RAN AWAY from fuberiber in Philadelphia, indentented Servan Man, named Patric Gelson, from East in Ireland; he is a flor by trade, about five feven or eight inches ftout made, has fhort brown hair, round full face, a little pock-pitted. Had when he went away, a coating coat, of light colour, with yellow but-

Mrs. Bunnell inherited this through generations of Americans dating back to the Mayflower. She is one of the regions only DARs and undoubtedly the paper has been kept because it contains the original publication of Washington's "Farewell Orders to the Armies of the United States.

There's something mighty American about the feud that is now going on at Wolf Run between one rancher, who is incidentally the largest taxpayer in the Wolf Run district and the Osborn clan which is running the school board, clerk, and teaching. The rancher is an outsider in the minds of mountain men and he thinks the school should send its three students to the modern new school at Dufer, nine miles away. He is already sending his son there, at an extra cost of \$275 a year. In addition to this, he pays most of the \$6000 operating budget of the school. We've always thought it would be theoretically possible for the youngsters in a one-room school house to get a better basic education than in a larger school.
