Bill Henselman, star quarterback for the Sandy High School Pioneers, was the unanimous choice of all six coaches in the Willamette Valley League, for top honors at the quarterback spot this season. His selection as the league's finest quarterback was announced Sunday.

Buildings Cited To Mental Care

SALEM — Three new buildings, costing \$890,000, were opened here Sunday at the Fairview home for the mentally deficient.

The addition to the school, which now has an enrollment of 850 girls and 1030 boys includes a multipurpose room, administration building, and a dormitory.

Governor Robert D. Holmes spoke the dedicatory address.

Other buildings scheduled to further enlarge the school include a girls dormitory, two replacement dormitories, additions to the hospital and heating plant and the addition of a disturbed patients' cottage.

The school carries a waiting list of 450.

The building, a \$500,000 structure built of Oregon wood products, will be used as a research center, will house the forest products laboratory and the forest lands research agency.

Tillamook Burn Timber Brings State \$375,000

SALEM — One of the last large blocks of snags in the famous Tillamook burn area brought \$375,620 into state coffers here last week as 30 million board feet of fire-killed timber in the Kilches river watershed went under the auctioneers hammer.

The timber had been appraised by the state forester at \$309,465. Three of the blocks with 26,410,000 board feet went to the Diamond Lumber company, Portland and the Forest Grove Lum-

Suspended licenses List Released To Newspapers

SALEM — The first list of state drivers' license suspension was released here by S. F. Johnson, director of the state motor vehicle department.

The list will be released weekly with the hope that the publication of the names of those who have suspended licenses will cut down on the infractions, Johnson said. He said that driving with suspended license or without a license are subject to a sentence up to six months in jail and a \$500 fine.

Four men from Clackamas county had licenses suspended — none of them from the Sandy-Mt. Hood area.

Norblad Eyes Governorship

SALEM — Reports drifting into the capitol during the past few days indicate that Congressman Walter Norblad is giving serious thought to the possibility that he might seek the Republican governorship nomination next year instead of seeking another term as Oregon's second district congressman.

Norblad last year was on the verge of seeking the governorship nomination but was talked out of it at the last minute by a group of Republican leaders, leaving a clear field for Governor Elmo Smith, who was defeated by Democrat Robert D. Holmes in the general election.

Reports reaching Salem disclose that Holmes apparently has slipped somewhat since he took office in January, and Norblad is said to feel that the time is ripe to toss his hat into the governorship race.

If Norblad should seek the governorship, it is considered more than likely that Phil Hitchcock will file for congress on Norblad's district. But if Norblad seeks re-election it is felt here in Salem that Hitchcock might make his bid against Holmes.
