Traffic Light Law Explained

Many motorists still do not understand the Oregon law permitting turns against red lights, as evidenced at most intersections controlled by traffic signals.

The law, in effect for a number of years, permits drivers to make a right turn against a red light, after stopping. It also permits a left or

right turn against a red light, after stopping, when entering a one-way street.

These turns are always legal unless otherwise directed by a police officer or a sign at a specific intersection, the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles said.

Failure to take advantage of the law causes unnecessary traffic congestion.

In making all such turns, officials said drivers should proceed with caution so as not to conflict with traffic going through on the green light.
