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Darrell Jones Badly Injured In Early Morning Auto Crash On Baldock Freeway Sunday

County Commissioner Darrell Jones, 40, is in Portland Sanitarium with serious multiple injuries as the result of a two-car auto crash on the Baldock Highway early last Sunday morning. Also hospitalized briefly in Doctor's Hospital in Oregon City was Deputy Sheriff Vernon White, a passenger in the Jones car. White suffered cuts over his left eye which required 30 stitches.

The car driven by Jones collided with one driven by V. L. Musser, deputy state insurance commissioner. Riding with Musser was Richard Stearns, 39, of Salem, who suffered a broken right knee and hand fractures. Musser was cut and bruised but not hospitalized.

Reports from Portland Sanitarium indicate that Jones suffered two rib fractures, a

broken right wrist and other painful cuts and abrasions.

The accident reportedly was caused by an unknown motorist who was driving on the wrong side of the highway and forced the Jones car into one driven by Musser.

The crash was investigated by State Police Officer Glen Wagner. Musser told Wagner that the unknown motorist who was primarily the cause of the crash by driving on the left side of the roadway continued on without stopping to offer assistance to the injured of the two cars.

Residents of Sandy and the Mt. Hood area are planning to join with all of Clackamas county in participation in the Oregon Centennial celebration which will get under way officially in February and continue for the remainder of next year.

The Oregon Trail Riders of this area who voted to take part in the Pony Express, will re-enact the glamorous days of the early west when men and horses carried the mail over the rough trails from the east to the western frontier.

Plans are now under way to start the Pony Express from some point in Kansas or Missouri and have relays of

pony express riders carry it over the route of the early Oregon Trail to Astoria.

The Oregon Trail Riders will pick up the mail at Horsethief Flat near Government Camp and carry it to the Multnomah county line, where they will be met by the Sheriff's Posse.

The post office department will issue special commemorative stamps costing \$1 each to be used on mail to be carried by this Pony Express. These stamps in future years are expected to become collectors' items.

The Sandy Chamber of Commerce will aid in this promotion work, with John Mills heading the committee.

At Rhododendron this Friday evening the Mt. Hood Boosters' Club will meet to discuss the mountain area's participation in the Centennial plans. An official from the Oregon Centennial Commission will meet with the group and urge that the mountain community revive the old Barlow Trail as one of the historical features of the celebration.

Joe Kiefer, president of the club, has urged all residents of the mountain area to attend and take part in the discussion. The meeting is scheduled for 8 PM.

County participation in the celebration of the Oregon centennial will be urged at a meeting Tuesday, November 18 at 7:30 PM in the Clackamas county court house.
