Schools In Sandy To Open Sept. 1

SANDY — Sandy Union high school will open its doors Tuesday, September 1, school officials here said this week.

School will be in session all day and the cafeteria will be open for hot lunches at noon.

All school buses will follow regular routes this year and are expected to follow the same time schedule as last year. The Deep Creek bus will follow the same route as it did for the first semester of last year.

All students who plan to attend school this year are expected to start school the first day if possible. Students who start school late are often left behind and many times never catch up to their classmates.

School fees will be the same as they were last year.

New students to the district and students who were in the school last year but failed to complete their pre-registration are to come in to the high school and complete their pre-registration in the mornings August 24 to August 28. Any students who dropped out of school or were suspended from school last year and intend to reapply for admission must come to school and apply for readmission in the mornings August 24 and August 28.

New teachers in the district are as follows.

VICE PRINCIPAL — David Wienecke. He has taught at Jacksonville, Scappoose and

has been dean of boys for the last four years at Hillsboro. He has received his master's degree from the University of Oregon. He is married and has two children.

MUSIC INSTRUCTOR — Omar Bose. He will teach instrumental music and vocal music. He has taught several Dakota, Iowa and the last three years in Washington county in Oregon. He received his master's degree in music from Pacific University at Forest Grove. He is married and has three children.

Mathematics and basketball coach — James Tillman. He will teach algebra 1, regular math, plane geometry and ad-

vanced general math. He has taught at McGrew, Culbertson and Bayard high schools in Nebraska. He received his masters degree from the University of Wyoming at Laramie, Wyoming. He is married and has one child.

English and Mathematics — Donald Shaw. He has one year teaching experience at Mosier, Oregon. He will teach English 1 and 9th grade math. He received his BA degree at Whitman college, Walla Walla Washington. He is married and has two children.

A homemaking teacher will be picked before school is started.

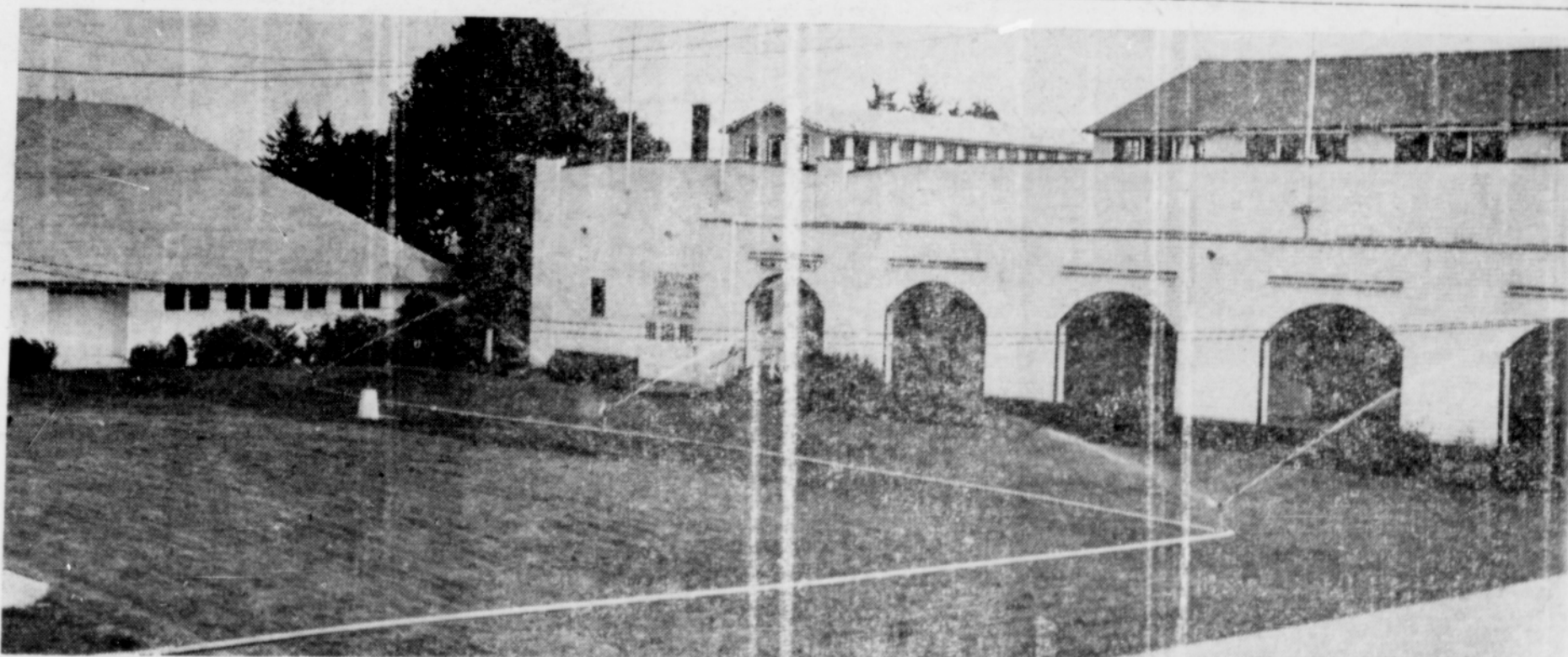
DADS CLUB BREAKFAST
