

RECORDS TO BE BROKEN

CANBY — The 53rd annual Clackamas county fair will open morning, August 19, and the fair board expects all earlier attendance records to be broken.

The 1959 fair will be bigger in several departments, will inaugurate many new features and has been better advertised and promoted. An attendance of more than 15,000 is anticipated.

set up in the county will be in operation in a new location with more room and has been widely heralded throughout the county. The carnival will give away a new bicycle to some lucky boy or girl during the fair. Thousands of treasure chest keys and wooden nickles are being distributed by more than 80 merchants around the county. Some of the keys will fit lock boxes containing prizes in the fair pavilion. Wooden nickles will be worth five cents only in the fair grounds.

The horse department has been greatly enlarged. It has brought entries from all parts of Oregon and also from California, Washington and Idaho.

ho. Besides an open class hors show Saturday afternoon, a program of races and other contests arranged by the saddle clubs will be staged Friday and Saturday.

The horse show will include separate classes for American Saddle, Arabians, Palominos, Quarter Horses, Tennessee Walking, Appaloosas, Hackneys, Welsh ponies and Shetland ponies. Dick Wagner is superintendent of this department. So many horses will be on the grounds that a special ring and bleachers has been set up in the pine grove for judging 4H horse entries. The nightly performances will be free to everybody inside the grounds. Craig Landeen is the rodeo producer.

The 26 garden clubs of the Clackamas district are cooperating in staging the flower show under Federation regulations. Mrs. Charles Sandness is superintendent. Among the new and unique entries promised will be on exhibit by the Northwest Cactus and Succulent Society, whose president is Mrs. D. E. Wellbaum of Mulino.

NEW RANGER TOLD

ESTACADA — The transfer of Robert P. Sorber to the Hood National Forest was announced this week by Forest Supervisor Paul E. Neff. He will replace R. E. Worthington who has been assigned as recreation and lands staff assistant at the Supervisor's headquarters in Portland.

Sorber has been assigned to the Applegate District of the Rogue River National Forest for the past six years as timber management forester and assistant ranger. Previously he served two years as forester on the Union Creek district. He received his forestry education at the University of California, graduating in 1951. He first worked for the forest service at Union Creek during the summer of 1948 as a forestry aid.

Sorber is a native of Bloomington, Pennsylvania. He is 39 years of age. He served in the Air Force during the years 1943 to 1946. He is a member of the Society of American Foresters. Within his profession he has gained a reputation as a highly skilled forester and a stickler for perfection.

The Sorbers expect to move about August 10. Their new headquarters will be the Ripplebrook Ranger station on the Clackamas river.

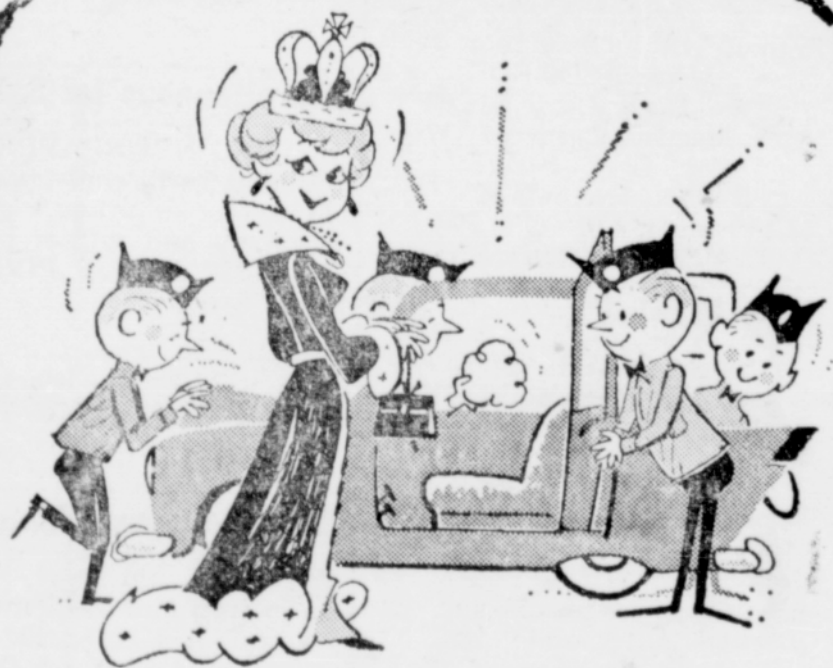
