Kolln is survived by relatives in Germany.

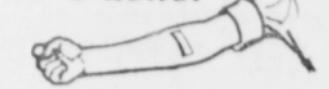
at any time, in the Oswego library during the time it is open, or in the court house in Oregon City during business hours.

Lecturer Puts Emphasis On Scientific Prayer

Individual spiritual perception and alertness are essential to the attainment of true peace and harmony, declared Ralph Castle of Belvedere, California, in a public lecture in Gresham January 24.

Mr. Castle called upon his audience to demonstrate the effectiveness of scientific prayer -- prayer based on God's law.

Business, health, and other everyday problems can and must be solved through a clearer, more spiritually scientific understanding of God and man, he maintained.

A member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship, Mr. Castle spoke under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist in the Gresham Union High School auditorium. The subject of his lecture was "Christian Science: A Demonstrable Everyday Religion." He was introduced by Mrs. Iva Larsen, Second Reader.

"Demonstrating the truth of being is an individual experience," the lecturer declared.

Until difficulties of every kind, he said, are reduced by scientific prayer to the point where they have been mastered in individual consciousness, harmony and peace of mind will not be attained.

"Let us now work as individuals scientifically to bring joy, peace, and health to mankind," he said, adding that "it must start with you and with me and with others in individual human consciousness."

Mr. Castle held that the teachings of Christian Science are in accord with the spiritual truths contained in the Bible.

"With the unfoldment to us of these spiritual truths, we are enabled mentally to penetrate the fog of materiality with its beliefs of sin, sickness, and death, and to find rest, health, and peace of mind in the blessed assurance of the spiritual power made available to us individually, here and now," he declared.

It has been proved thousands of times and publicly acknowledged, he said, that the light which spiritual perception throws on the Bible has brought physical healing, comfort, and regeneration to those willing to turn to God for help.

The lecturer described how demonstrable religion is being applied to business, health, and other problems. He told of the experience of a young man who was working his way through medical school by playing the organ. His health broke down and the time arrived when he was informed that he must resign himself to being a chronic invalid.

"This verdict was delivered," he said, "after an X-ray examination revealed what was termed a malignant growth which was considered inoperable."

The student's position was desperate, the lecturer said. When a friend asked him if he would be willing to have a Christian Science practitioner

in a distant city help him through prayer, he replied that he would try anything once.

"About three weeks later," he related, "he had an appointment with the doctor for a routine check-up. His health had so improved during this time under Christian Science treatment that he walked a distance of ten blocks to the doctor's office, a thing he had previously found impossible."

The doctor, who was quite alarmed about this, he continued, "made the customary examination, but at the conclusion announced that he was not satisfied so he made a second check and took several X-ray photographs, asking the patient to return the following day. The patient, of course, complied, and after a much more thorough examination and reference to the X-ray pictures, the doctor finally exclaimed, 'You're 100 percent well, and I won't have to see you again -- it's a miracle.'"

Commenting on this healing, the lecturer noted that the young man as a medical student had ridiculed the idea of healing through prayer, but honesty and gratitude prompted him to find out for himself about Christian Science. He added that he gave up his medical studies, became a church member, and confined his professional activities to music.

He explained that in Christian Science the word prayer or treatment "means invoking the law of God; its basis is a spiritual understanding of perfect God and perfect man."

Emphasizing the far-reaching effect of one's mental attitude upon outward conditions, Mr. Castle quoted the following from the writings of Mary Baker Eddy: "To live so as to keep human consciousness in constant relation with the divine, the spiritual, and the eternal, is to individualize infinite power; and this is Christian Science" (The First Church of Christ, Scientist, and Miscellany, p. 160).

The remedy for inharmony lies in the spiritual realization that there is no place or condition where one can be deprived of God's presence, he stated.

He added: "Our own demonstration of harmony requires our steadfast recognition that God's law governs our fellow being as well as ourselves. When we claim perfection, and realize our spiritual selfhood as an individual idea of divine Principle, we see the harmony of God's ideas."

YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

QUESTION: I am a self-employed person. How do I report my income and pay the tax for social security credit?

ANSWER: If you are a self-employed farmer, you should file a Schedule F, "Schedule of Farm Income and Expenses," along with your Federal Income Tax Return. If you are otherwise self-employed you should file a Schedule C, "Profit (or Loss) From Business or Profession."

QUESTION: I am a woman 30 years of age. I have not been feeling well lately and have decided to stop working for a few years. Should I "freeze" my social security record?

ANSWER: Only those persons who are severely disabled and are not expected to recover for an indefinite period are potentially eligible for the freeze. It does not appear your work or that of your disability is expected to be of long continued duration.

QUESTION: Should I die leaving my wife, a natural child and an adopted child, would monthly social security benefits be paid to my adopted child the same as they would be to my natural child?

ANSWER: Yes. Your widow would be requested to provide the Social Security Administration with a copy of the adoption decree. Otherwise, the claims of both the children would be handled alike.
