Problems Told For Boating

Pleasure boating is the Nation's fastest-growing family sport, with its growth, however, has come ever-increasing problems - problems of safety, education, identification and law enforcement. In order to take steps to cut the boating accident and death toll, to provide a uniform system of numbering to discourage theft and to facilitate identification in emergencies, as well as insure the best possible use of our recreational waterways for all, Federal and State lawmakers, working in cooperation with representatives of boating organizations, developed state boating programs.

The Oregon program, which is administered by the new State Marine Board, has a number of duties relating to boating. The most important of these is to maintain a safe boating program on the waters of Oregon.

President Eisenhower has proclaimed July 3 to 9 as National Safe Boating Week. The State Marine Board has published a new pamphlet titled "Safe Boating" which it is hoped will be read, and the safety features therein practiced, by every boater in Oregon. The new pamphlet may be obtained from boat dealers and county sheriffs.

Here is a safety program that is needed NOW for already this year boating accidents have claimed the lives of ten Oregonians. This program deserves the community's support to keep boating a safe and wholesome sport.

LAKE ROSLYN: Slacked off some from a fast pace but still producing good catches on worms or single eggs. Trollers also taking fish.

AUSTIN HOT SPRINGS: Fair on worms or eggs. Morning and evening fly fishing good.
