IDA C. NORDIN
Ida Christina Nordin, Rt. 1 Box 451 Boring passed away in Gresham July 18 after a short illness. She was born June 5 1876 in Finland and came to the U.S. in about 1900. She lived in Portland where she was married to Eric Nordin in 1905. He passed away in 1925.

She moved to Boring 43 yrs. ago and has lived there since. She is survived by her children, Earl and Edward Nordin and Mrs. Edith Dodson all of Boring; 2 grandchildren and two great grandchildren also survive. Rev. BESSIE E. MOUNT
Bessie Elizabeth Mount of Star Route Box 48 Sandy, Ore. (Brightwood) suddenly died on July 20, 1960 at her home. Mrs. Mount was born Bessie Elizabeth Wallace, May 22, 1886 in South Dakota, and at the time of her death was 74 years of age. The early part of her life was spent in South Dakota where she attended school and grew to womanhood. At about the age of 17 she left the state of her birth and moved to Oregon, settling in Silverton. That was her home until 1921, when she moved to McMinn-

ville, and a short time later to Portland.

In 1931 they made their home at Brightwood. On Aug. 20, 1908 at Eugene Oregon she married Robert B. Mount. For years they both worked in the Telephone Co. at Silverton, Oregon. She was an active member of the Grange, and for 6 years she was the Chaplain of the Clackamas Pomona Grange. She was also the Chaplain of the Sandy Grange 392. She was a member of the Rebekah of McMinnville, and a Sister of the Knights of Pythias of Silverton. She has been ill only for a short time.

The surviving members of her family include her husband Robert B. of Brightwood and 2 daughters, Mrs. Alex McKay (Irene) Seavey of Springfield Oregon, and Mrs. Stanley (Roberta) Parker of San Diego, Cal. There are 4 grandchildren. Cremation was at Lincoln Memorial. Father Franklin Evenson offered the services and Mrs. G. Edwards sang.

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No Oversupply Of Jobs In Oregon Yet

OREGON CITY--Good weather in June helped the heavy back-to-work movement in most industries in Clackamas County, particularly logging, lumbering, construction and agriculture. However, employment in worsted yarn, garment, and plywood manufacturing was running approximately 75 per cent, with workers on a short week or part of them laid off temporarily. The strawberry harvest finally got underway in mid-June and at the peak approximately 14,000 pickers, mostly youngsters, were employed and happily making money for themselves and the farmers.

Job openings in June were slightly better than in May, but below June of last year, and increased requirements for industrial workers did not develop as anticipated. In fact, some major manufacturing concerns laid off some skilled workers on a temporary basis due to slack business conditions or lack of raw materials. The impact of the job-seeking high school and college students was felt in the permanent labor market. Most students who are looking for permanent work have secured

employment, particularly in the female clerical field. It is estimated that of the 1250 unemployed in Clackamas County at the end of the month, approximately 400 are inexperienced workers, many of them students who intend to return to school this fall.

Initial claims declined considerably under May, but continued claims ran well above last year in spite of decline from May of this year. Unemployment fluctuated somewhat throughout the month, with quite a few temporary layoffs and callbacks.

The outlook for unemployed high school and college students who intend to return to school in the fall is rather bleak unless they have a particular skill to sell. Jobs open for men at the end of the month were: mechanical engineer, mechanical draftsman, dental technician, auto mechanic (journeyman), plumber (const.), experienced electrician, appliance cal serviceman, motorboat mechanic, automatic screw machine operator, machine washer, machine presser, auto body repairman, and tractor operator. For women the jobs open were: teller, clerk-stenographer, housekeepers, clerk-typist, maid, waitress, and fry cook.
