## Report On Farm Income

In a report from J. J. Inskeep, County Extension Agent a breakdown of the overall agriculture income for Clackamas County proves its crops are for the birds as the figures show. Clackamas County is fast becoming a major poultry producing area of the Pacific Northwest... the 1960 income was \$8,371,800.

The county's 500,000 laying hens averaged 221 eggs, this was up one egg per bird from the previous year. The average price was 40 cents a dozen, up 4 cents from 1959.

Broiler growers produced 2,500,000 broilers with an average weight of 3 1/2 lbs. which brought the grower an average of 19.5 cents per lb, up 2 1/2 cents from 1959.

Turkey growers produced 300,000 prime birds with an average weight of 20 lbs. They sold at 28 cents, up 5 cents from 1959. Other turkey growers also kept fine breeding flocks primarily for egg production. These eggs are in great demand in other states according to Inskeep. Total returns was \$715,000.

### DAIRY:

Receipts from dairy products totalled \$2,331,000, up slightly from 1959. Milk prices were a little better. The most significant trend is toward fewer cows in the county, fewer herds with large cow numbers per herd, and higher production per cow.

### MEAT ANIMALS

Sales of meat animals came to \$3,209,500, up slightly due mostly to more hogs raised and sold, and a little better price. Lamb prices were not so good with total sales estimated at \$459,000 compared to \$513,000, the previous year.

Inskeep reported further with our present production of feed grains, mostly corn, there would appear to be opportunity for expansion of pork production. The big problem is one of competition with the corn belt. Type of hogs offered for slaughter is very important.

### HORTICULTURE SPECIALTY CROPS

These include such items as nursery crops, flower bulbs, flower seeds, holly, green house products, cut flowers, and vegetable seeds. Income--\$1,705,000, down slightly from 1959. However, sales from these items are difficult to estimate at present and it may be income from nursery products have been underestimated. There is likely that a gradual expansion in this highly technical field is desirable, in fact it is underway.

## Every Driver Has Potential For Accidents

The killer behind a steering wheel could be your own emotion--out of control--says one of America's leading psychiatrists.

Anger, for example, can be murderous or suicidal for a motorist, according to Dr. Karl Menninger, chairman of the Menninger Foundation in Topeka, Kansas.

Dr. Menninger, writing in an insurance company house organ, points out that we tend to avoid responsibility for our accidents.

"Accidents, we say, are caused by fate, by hard luck, by inadvertence or ignorance or carelessness or distraction or alcohol," writes Dr. Menninger.

But if a driver becomes careless, the psychiatrist asks, what factors in him contributed to that costly, careless moment?

The article, entitled "Accidents Are Seldom Accidental," offers this grim answer: "There is a little murder and a little suicide dwelling in every man's heart. Give him such a powerful weapon as a car, inflame his inhibitions or irritations or frustrations, then add alcohol or fatigue, and the murder or suicide may get committed."

Discussing "accident proneness," which has been a widely used term, Dr. Menninger writes in the 4 million circulation publication:

"Today we would rather say that accident proneness is something that all of us have more or less, and more on one day than on another. The question is, what is your accident proneness level today?"

"It fluctuates with various factors. Resentments stemming from childhood, weariness, fatigue, a series of disappointments. And sometimes these feelings lead to an accident."

"We know that relatively few accidents are wholly accidental. The number of accidents ascribable to pure chance must be well below 15 percent."

Dr. Menninger concludes: "No health-minded person ever says--'It can't happen to me'. He might meet a fool, you know. Or he might even temporarily be one."

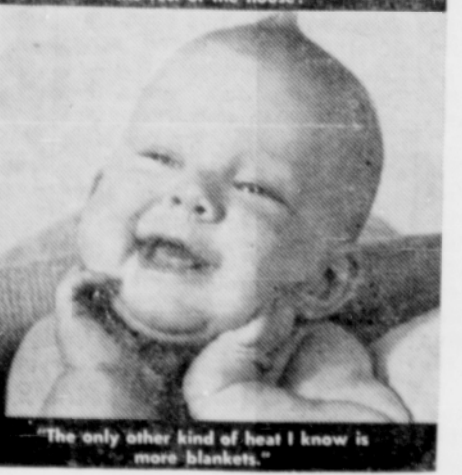
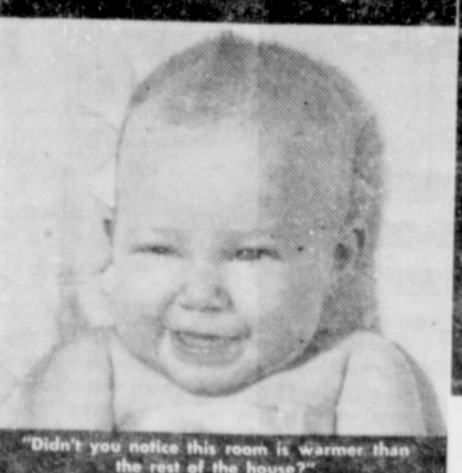
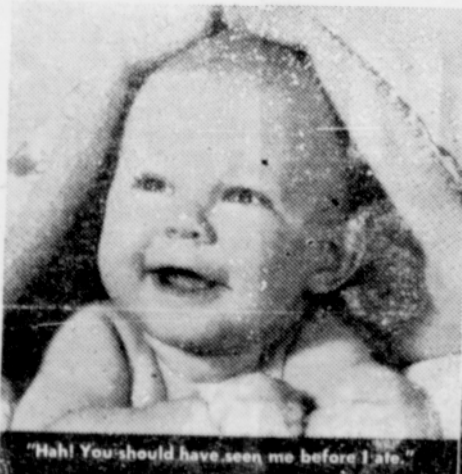
INTERVIEWER: Germs are very small, Amy Sue. You can't see them.
