Wilco League Champion Loses Playoff Contest

The rains came Monday evening... but not soon enough to save the Reynolds Lancers.

Vandals Strip Bark From Cascara Trees

Theft of a considerable quantity of cascara bark was reported to sheriff's deputies Monday by Mrs. Loretta White of Rt. 3, Box 405, Gresham.

The bark was stripped from 100 or more trees at the White residence and in such a way, Mrs. White said, that the trees probably will die.

Cascara bark, used for medicinal purposes, is valued at from 10 to 30 cents per pound.

Survey Crews Check For Pine Shoot Moth

Oregon State Forestry department survey crews are working in East Multnomah county area to spot check pine trees for signs of the European pine shoot moth, according to Bob Madsen, administrative assistant at survey headquarters.

Timber owners and foresters in Oregon are concerned with the presence of the moth, which was detected in the Portland area last year for the first time.

According to Madsen, this destructive insect could do vast damage to Oregon's pine stands if it becomes established.

To determine whether this serious pest has spread beyond its point of discovery in Portland, the Oregon State Forestry department, in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service, is conducting an intensive survey in the Portland area by well-trained crews.

Each crew members will wear special apparel and bear proper credentials for easy identification. This will consist of a base-

ball cap with a shoulder patch for shirt or jacket.

"Cooperation of property owners is needed," Madsen said, "from the standpoint of permitting the survey—teams access to property in the concentrated effort to determine extent of the insect's spread, if any."

At this time there is no known method of effecting control with chemical spray application. However, results of recent fumigation tests in Seattle on individual trees, appear very promising.

The shoot moth, which attacks young pine trees—deforming and stunting them—was introduced in the United States in 1914 from Europe in a shipment of nursery stock. The insect has since spread and has caused extensive damage to young pine stands in the eastern states.

The distorted and dead ends of branches are the most conspicuous evidence of attack, and can be seen in late spring and early summer which new growth is developing.
