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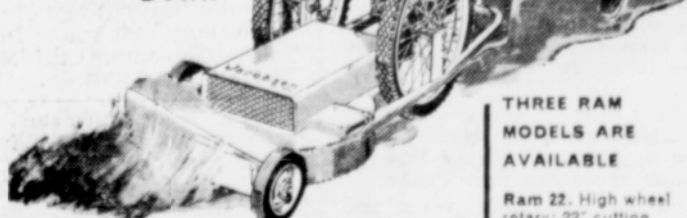

## Oregon May Lose Money From Public Land Timber

Oregon counties may lose an estimated \$1 million in revenues this year from timber cut on mining claims on public lands administered by the U.S. Forest Service, and the O & C counties will ask for federal legislation to prevent this in the future.

Darrell Jones, president of the association, said that under the law, holders of mining claims on O & C lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management had no right to the timber. On so-called controverted lands, however, government attorneys say that patented claims include surface rights. The O & C counties feel that this was not the intent of the law.

Jones said the mining claim problem was one of a number of important matters which he and Judge Cal Barnhart, Polk county, dealt with in Washington on a recent trip on behalf of the O & C counties. The two county officials were also invited to attend sessions with lumber industry representatives and government officials on the Japanese log export problem.

"Our association is disturbed by the exporting of our greatest resource in increasing amounts," Jones said. "We are afraid that

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unrestricted exports of unprocessed logs will soon have a detrimental effect on our mills and their employees."

On the trip, Jones and Barnhart had discussions with Secretary of the Interior Udall, BLM Director Karl Landstrom, Edward Cliff, assistant chief of the Forest Service, Senator Maurice Neuberger, and Congressman Al Ullman and Edwin Duran, among others.

In addition to the export and mining claim problems, business included discussions concerning projected revenues to the 18 O & C counties from timber sales in future years, BLM's plan to develop — with county cooperation — a large recreation area on the Rogue river in Josephine and Curry counties, and the county access road, reforestation, and other management programs on about 2,500,000 acres of O & C lands, which yielded revenues in excess of \$32,000,000 in 1960.

Of this, \$16,258,000 was distributed to the counties, over \$8,000,000 was appropriated by the O & C association for reinvestment in roads, reforestation, and management of the lands, and the balance went to the federal treasury.

Clackamas county's direct return from O & C last year was \$926,738 but because of lumber market conditions, will probably be somewhat less this year, Jones said. "Nevertheless," the commissioner stated, "our equity in the O & C lands is one of the most important assets of Clackamas county now and in the future, and must be constantly protected."

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## Post Office Bids Close Tomorrow

Final date for bids to build and lease a new post office building at Government Camp close Friday, June 9, according to the real estate office of the Post office department.

The present post office building, located in the business area of Government Camp, was cited by post officials as too old and too small to carry on the necessary operations.

Specifications call for a structure containing approximately 850 square feet of interior floor space with a 40 square foot platform and 5000 square feet for a parking and maneuvering area. Bidders must own the site.

The proposed new building will be leased to the Post Office Department under a five-year lease with renewal options year to year.

## Mail Run Contract Not Yet Decided

No official word has been received at the Sandy post office regarding provision of mail service from Sandy to Government Camp. Bids were called for in April and were opened May 25 in the post office headquarters in Seattle.

Present contract, held by Mr. and Mrs. John Christensen of Sandy, ends June 30. They didn't bid this year because of a proposed four-hour layover in Government Camp that would have interfered with other activities.

The couple have operated the mail run for the past 15 years—he for 11 when the route included Gresham and Boring and she for four years when it was limited to mountain service.

Stops on the 32-mile trip include Brightwood, Wemme, Zig Zag, Welches, Rhododendron and Government Camp.

## Rambo Ford Opens Sandy Operations

## Clackamas County Social Security Benefits Listed

By the end of 1960, more than 8,142 people in Clackamas County were receiving old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits. The total benefits paid to these people for December 1960 was \$372,224 according to Paul F. Johnson, manager of the Portland Social Security district office. "This is an increase in the number of people receiving benefits by about nine per cent over the same month last year," he said.

Nationally, almost 15 million people were receiving about a billion dollars a month in old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits at the close of 1960, the 20th year that Social Security benefits have been payable.

Clackamas County people participate and share in this program along with the rest of the United States. The figures below show the number and monthly amount of each type of benefit being paid in Clackamas County as of December 31, 1960—the date of the latest available figures.

More than 5068 retired workers received \$380,111; 182 disabled workers, \$17,324; 1546 wives or husbands, of retired or disabled workers, \$59,340; 814 widows or widowers, \$45,928; 11 dependent parents, \$820; 155 Mother with child, \$10,589; 1085 children of retired, deceased or disabled workers, \$58,112.
