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Sheriffs Plan Firearms Show

A free firearms show under sponsorship of Clackamas County Sheriff Joe Shobe and his department is scheduled for Saturday, June 24, at the lobby of the West Linn Inn in Oregon City.

The show will emphasize "gun safety," featuring booths, displays, movies and door prizes.

The grand winner of the firearms safety writing contest for Clackamas county boys and girls sponsored by the sheriff's department will be awarded a .22 calibre rifle.

Continuous movies will be shown throughout duration of the show, from 1 to 10 p.m. Among the movies will be a 30 minute film on the six-shooter and another depicting the production of the fiberglass barrel for the Model 59 Winchester rifle.

Included in the displays will be famous old guns from a valuable collection owned by Colt. Winchester and Remingtons will also display their lines of guns.

The Game Commission will have a booth with firearm safety experts on hand to hand out literature and answer questions. They will also have a display of Oregon game.

Hancock will be associated with the Multnomah general office of his firm in the Lloyd center in Portland.

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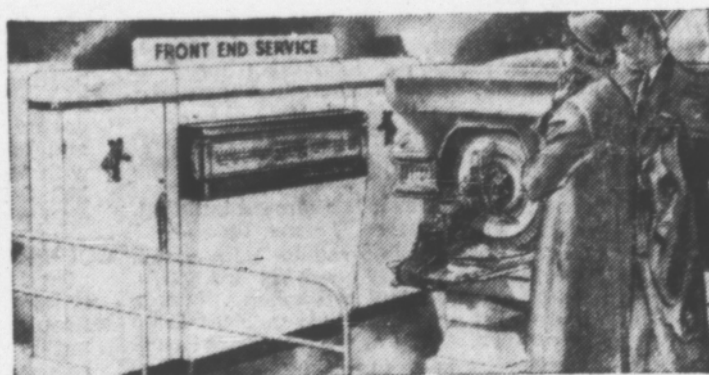
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
